I have no idea who created or proclaimed April 4th as the day to officially HUG A NEWSPERSON. (It wasn't me, but I'm definitely o.k. with it!)

I do know, however, that we journalists mark April 18th each year in honor of the late Ernie Pyle, the great newsman and World War II correspondent who wrote countless first-person dispatches from Europe and later (because he believed that there were many more "G.I. Joe" stories that needed to be told) from the Pacific. He wrote about ordinary people who, in the course of battle, often did extraordinary things. His life was lost on April 18, 1945, killed by machine gun fire while on patrol with Marines on the small island of le Shima, west of Okinawa. (My late father, Theodore Passalis, was serving with the Army's 7th "Hour Glass" Division, 17th Infantry Regiment, Company C, on Okinawa at that time.)

Throughout his career many of Pyle's stories were based on his belief that "It's the little things that count," as he once told his editor. His reporting decades ago about the day-to-day experiences of people he encountered continues to inspire my own writing/publishing which focuses on "all the little things" that make OUR community and its residents unique.

Village Update


April is here. The recent snow and cold will give way to warmer spring weather soon! Please be extra careful of pedestrians and bicyclists as everyone begins to enjoy outdoor activities.

- *Meetings with We Energies. Village staff and the Board have been meeting with We Energies to review the impact and steps forward resulting from the January snow event. Thank you to residents who took the time to express their concerns to Trustees and in writing. Representatives of We Energies attended the March Committee of the Whole ("COW") meeting and reviewed projects being launched over the next two years to improve the performance and redundancy of the electrical grid and tree trimming within the Village. The Board expressed the frustration residents experienced during the January outage and more recent outages and the need for improved and accurate communication and updates related to outages. Key takeaways from the meeting include:
- * We Energies will provide an update to the Board every six months, at a minimum, on the overall progress on projects and tree trimming activities.
- * We Energies will provide an assessment of the electrical equipment age versus expected useful life and review impact.
- * We Energies is reviewing their outage reporting and communication across their service region to make improvements.
- * Increased awareness of the need to follow through on resident requests for tree trimming.
- * Village staff will report to the Board all outages monthly, including reasons and corrective actions taken.

To facilitate this process, I ask residents to review the electrical lines and power poles on their property and send pictures via e-mail to the Village. The Board is seeking to document and expedite actions, as well as provide visual documentation to the Public Service Commission, to increase the pace of improvements.

Finally, residents can help facilitate We Energies projects by allowing contractors timely access to their property. Additionally, as construction projects commence, there may be a need for new or modified easements on your property as power lines are buried. Please work with the We Energies outsourced service provider to complete this process timely.

*Volunteer Opportunities. Please express your interest to serve as a volunteer committee member using the on-line form available on the Village's website to participate in guiding the direction of the Village. www.elmgrove.wi.org



*Public Works and Utilities Committee. Highland Road Pathway. The Committee reviewed the bids received from contractors for the pathway project. After thoughtful discussion, the committee is recommending to the Board approval of C. W. Purpero, Inc. for this project. Village staff and engineers continue to work with the railroad and other regulators to finalize the permits and design documents. Design work continues on storm sewer culvert with a request for proposal recently released. The Board is aware of the need to limit the disruption to local traffic as these projects commence.

*Brush Pick-up. The Public Works team will commence brush pick-up the first week in April. Initial efforts will be to collect limbs from the January snow event.

*Sustainability Committee.

The Sustainability Committee is bringing focus to outdoor lighting and will be sharing best practices over the coming months. As a reminder, responsible outdoor lighting encompasses lighting that is useful, targeted, low level, controlled and warm colored.

Separately, the Birders of the Grove are keen to help our feathered friends during the spring migration. One way residents can help is to participate in Elm Grove's "Lights Out" initiative. This voluntary program encourages residents to dim or turn off non-essential outdoor lighting during the peak migration period of April 15-May 15 (and again in the Fall). See our Birds & Lights | Elm Grove, WI - Official Website (elmgrovewi.org) for more ideas. Dark skies are an important part of a healthy ecosystem and migration patterns.

*Village Park Beer Garden. Third Space Brewing presented a proposal to extend the partnership for the beer garden in the Park at the March (COW) meeting. There is mutual interest to continue the partnership and discussions will continue.

*Caroline Heights /Mandel Construction.
Water main construction will commence in April on the water loop connecting the existing water main back to Wauwatosa. After completion of the water loop, lateral installation will commence. For weekly updates, please refer to the Village website for updated information on the project.

Let's welcome spring and get outdoors to enjoy the warmer weather!

This effort is part of the Milwaukee Riverkeeper (milwaukeeriverkeeper.org) Adopt a River Program, in conjunction with the Elm Grove Beautification Committee.

The small creek that runs through the Village is part of the Milwaukee River basin. The entire basin is being restored to a natural state and Salmon have already been spotted just south of Sendik's. If we can do our part by removing liter and plastic debris, it will greatly contribute to a healthy, thriving ecosystem not only in the park, but in the entire Village.

Everyone is welcome, and no experience is needed. Most of the cleanup will be along the shore of the creek and in the Park. Gloves and trash bags will be provided.

Our History: Remembrances of Things Past



POLITICAL BUTTONS from the collection of Stephen K. Hauser. In 1964, major Democratic and Republican party contenders skipped Wisconsin's April presidential primary. (Gov. John Reynolds didn't even bother with a campaign button... his supporters were left to cover the bottom of his 1962 gubernatorial pins with black electrical tape, instead.)

Sixty Years Ago:

They Gave a Primary, and (Almost) Nobody Came By Stephen K. Hauser

This year, Wisconsin's quadrennial April presidential primary seems to be a proverbial afterthought. The leading Democratic and Republican contenders have likely already captured their respective party nominations. This alone removes much of the drama that would ordinarily surround a race for the White House in the Badger state. Sixty years ago, the situation was pretty much the same, but for very different reasons. The outcome in both parties was never really in doubt. Surprisingly, however, none of the leading aspirants for their parties' highest prize had their names listed on the primary ballot, and since write-in votes were not allowed in Wisconsin's presidential primaries back then, they could not even hope for a populist ground-swell of "grass roots" support.

The reasons for this bipartisan neglect of Wisconsin's voters differed, as both parties and their candidates all had their own reasons for not wishing to campaign in Dairyland in 1964. Strategy, a desire for future harmony and outright fear of other potential candidates (with accompanying risk of embarrassment) all played a role.

The presumptive Democratic Party nominee was President Lyndon B. Johnson, occupant of the White House for less than five months. Having assumed the office following the tragic assassination of John F. Kennedy on November 22, 1963, Johnson was haunted by the thought that he could be replaced on the ticket by the late President's younger brother, Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy. Sympathy for the grieving Kennedy family ran high among both Democrats and Republicans, and Johnson knew only too well that he was far different in both style and personality from the late Commander in Chief. He devised an interesting strategy to avoid being embarrassed in the primaries by a groundswell of popular support for the vounger, charismatic Kennedy: He simply would not enter the primary fray at all, but would approve "favorite son" surrogate candidates to capture the victory in the primary states who would turn their state delegations over to Johnson at the Democratic Party national convention that summer. (He wouldn't even bother with New Hampshire!)

Three state surrogates were chosen for Johnson loyalists: Sen. Daniel B. Brewster of Maryland, Gov. Matthew Welsh of Indiana, and Gov. John W. Reynolds of Wisconsin. Therefore, Reynolds would carry the flag for LBJ in the Badger state. No other names of potential Democratic choices would appear on the primary ballot. The Republicans, meanwhile, had decided upon a similar state strategy in Wisconsin, but for entirely different reasons.

In 1964, the race for the Republican presidential nomination had split badly between conservative and liberal G.O.P. activists. Conservatives were solidly united behind Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, a national spokesman for their cause and the

author of the bestselling book Conscience of a Conservative. Liberal Republicans, meanwhile, had rallied behind the multimillionaire Governor of New York, Nelson A. Rockefeller. His big governmentoriented reforms in the Empire state had made him popular with Democratic voters, as well as northeastern Republicans. (It should be noted here that, back in the 1950s and 1960s, the two major political parties were both far less ideological, and harbored both liberal and conservative adherents.)

To avoid an angry ideological split that could lead to wounded feelings and divisions in the fall, state Republicans chose to tap Congressman John W. Byrnes as their "favorite son" standard-bearer for the April contest. Byrnes, who had served northeastern Wisconsin in the House of Representatives since 1945, was a moderate, given to a mild manner and compromises. Hence, he was acceptable to both G.O.P. factions. (This solution also pleased both Goldwater and Rockefeller, as it saved their campaigns needed money and avoided a primary which neither candidate was sure he could win.)

The only "fly in the ointment" was Alabama Governor George C. Wallace. The southern Democrat was eyeing a thirdparty challenge in the fall on the issues of states' rights and opposition to federal civil rights legislation. He had no intention of truly seeking the Democratic Party nomination (and no realistic chance of actually getting it), but entered three northern state presidential primaries --- Maryland, Indiana and Wisconsin --- in hopes of raising funds and gaining publicity. (He would subsequently shelve his plans for the thirdparty bid that fall, but would resurrect them in 1968.)

The twin strategies of the Democrats and Republicans in Wisconsin that April may have served their respective partisan interests, but left state voters with no meaningful choice in the primary. On Tuesday, April 7, 1964, Badgers trooped to the polls and voted anyway. Congressman Byrnes, unopposed on the Republican ballot pulled 299,612 votes, including 13,371 in Waukesha County. Gov. John Reynolds, meanwhile, netted 522,405 ballots --- 19,919 in Waukesha County --- with the insurgent Wallace receiving 266,136 votes --- 16,483 of them in Waukesha County.

In November, President Johnson would defeat Sen. Goldwater, but Wisconsin voters had not participated in the selection process that chose either nominee. Although Johnson won in a landslide and carried Wisconsin in the process, Gov. Reynolds went on to lose the governorship that fall to Warren P. Knowles, the only Democratic incumbent governor to lose reelection in 1964.



The Little Church on the Triangle of Watertown Plank Road, Juneau Boulevard

As the congregation grew, the little church was abandoned, with mass being served in the Crescent Drive side of the parish school basement and finally in the present church beginning in 1963.

"Lights Out Elm Grove" Will Help Migrating Birds By Birders of the Grove

Spring signals the welcome return of our feathered friends as they migrate north to their nesting grounds. Elm Grove is both a destination and important waystation for migrating birds. Our woodland neighborhoods and abundant backyard feeders provide food and rest, and the pond at Village Park is an important stop-over for many different species of waterfowl.

Many birds do their migratory flying at night, when the winds are calm and the threat from predators is less. Traveling at night can be hazardous, however. The bright lights of an urban area can cause birds to become easily disoriented, resulting in deadly collisions with buildings and other structures. It is estimated that hundreds of millions of birds are killed each year in North America due to light disorientation.

To help birds navigate safely through our community this spring, Birders of the Grove is introducing "Lights Out Elm Grove". This voluntary program encourages residents and businesses to dim or turn off non-essential outdoor lights during the peak migration period of April 15th to May 15th. During this four-week period, homeowners and businesses can minimize outdoor lighting by doing the following:

- Turn off exterior decorative lighting
- Extinguish spot and flood-lights
- Turn off interior lighting on higher stories
- Down-shield exterior lighting to eliminate horizontal glare and avoid all lighting directed upward
- Install automatic motion sensors and controls wherever possible
- When converting to new lighting, assess the quality and quantity of light needed. Avoid over-lighting with newer, brighter technology.



"Lights Out" is an Audubon national effort to protect migratory birds. Many communities, particularly those along migratory flyways, have adopted the program.

Please consider participating in this annual "Lights Out" initiative every spring and fall.

Whether Elm Grove is a final destination or a respite stop on a continuing northbound journey, our little friends deserve safe travels.

The device is handheld and can be used with pinpoint precision at long distances. It can pick a single car speeding out of a group of cars, and can be used to measure distances. Speeding vehicles continues to be an area of concern among our residents and this equipment will be a great tool to use to respond to those complaints with enforcement action.

The television for the training room will be used for officer training, meetings, briefings, and community service events. The timing could not be better given we are starting a new CPA class in April.

'First on the Scene' Course Offered Free to Community

Accidents can happen anywhere. Do you know what to do if you happen upon one? What should you do or not do while you wait for EMS to arrive? The Elm Grove Citizen's Police Academy Alumni, in conjunction with Elm Grove EMS, is hosting a course at Village Hall on Saturday, May 11, from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., that will teach you what you need to do. The National Association of EMTs has designed a course for the general public that assumes no prior medical knowledge. The course, called First on the_Scene (FOTS), is being offered free of charge

The purpose of the FOTS course is to prepare people, including high school and college students, to help those who are injured and save lives until EMS arrives. Communities across the country and around the world recognize the need to prepare their citizens to respond to the injured until EMS personnel are on the scene.

During this course you will learn how to properly activate the 911 system, perform "hands-only CPR", learn how to use an AED, how to use an epinephrine auto injector to treat an anaphylactic reaction, and how to administer Narcan for opioid overdose. You will also learn bleeding control for lifethreatening bleeding using tourniquets and wound packing, how to treat for shock, when and how to properly move patients to safety, and how to position sick or injured people while waiting for help to arrive.

The course is hands-on, and you will be taught by active members of Elm Grove EMS. You will receive a certificate upon completion and feel better prepared for



unexpected emergencies that can happen anywhere.





Report from Madison

The election cycle is on the horizon, and the long-awaited redrawing and approval of the maps have finally taken place. This marks a significant win for Governor Evers and sets the stage for a crucial upcoming election.

State law requires that the election maps be redrawn every ten years after the census to account for population changes and ensure equal representation. Under Wisconsin's constitution, the legislature draws the maps, and then the Governor can approve or veto them.

There are a few additional requirements, like the districts must be compact and contiguous and, where possible, maintain political boundaries, i.e., keep municipalities whole. The process gives the party in control of the legislature the upper hand, but that's how it has always been. Both sides drew maps that favored themselves when they were in the majority and complained about gerrymandering while in the minority—until now.

After the most recent census, new maps were drawn, approved by the Supreme Court, and signed into law in 2022. However, the Wisconsin Supreme Court declared them unconstitutional earlier this year. The reason? Some districts were not "contiguous." This was true; there were situations where an island of one district was placed inside an adjoining district.

You might ask, "Why in the world would this happen?" The answer is reasonably straightforward. Municipalities have a natural progression as they grow, starting from a town to a village to a city. The land from the town slowly gets incorporated into the village or city. The residents of the land have a choice and can vote to become part of the city, or not. When the residents choose not to become part of the city, the city will continue to grow and can ultimately surround the pocket of land where the residents wish to stay part of the town. It happens, and several

islands exist between the City of Brookfield and the Town of Brookfield.

District map drawers now must make a choice. Is the island part of the Town, breaking the "contiguous" rule, or does it become part of the city, breaking the "maintain political boundaries" rule? Following precedents going back, as far as I know, the map makers have always favored maintaining political boundaries. It is a Catch-22 because it is impossible to follow both rules simultaneously.

With the Supreme Court siding with the Governor, the legislature had no choice but to accept his maps (which still included islands) or have the Supreme Court impose maps of their choosing.

But what does that mean for us? District 13 was essentially all of Brookfield and Elm Grove. The district was a compact rectangle of about 59,000 residents, and it maintained Elmbrook's political boundaries.

Under the Governor's Map, a significant change has occurred. Brookfield, previously a unified district, has now been divided. Elm Grove, along with the northeast quadrant of Brookfield, is now part of the more significant portion of Wauwatosa north of Bluemound Road. This change, while breaking political boundaries and being less compact, has eliminated the issue of islands. As a result, we are now politically aligned with Wauwatosa.

The team went 10-0 this season in the Brookfield Park and Recreational 4th/5th grade Youth Basketball League. They successfully took first in the regular season and the tournament.



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
















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
