On the Ballot: Election - April 1, 2025

Elm Grove residents can cast their ballots on Tuesday, April 1 (7 a.m. to 8 p.m.) at Village Hall, 13600 Juneau Blvd., for these offices: Elm Grove Village President; Village of Elm Grove Trustees (3 seats up for election); Elmbrook Board of Education members (Area 2 seat + At-Large seat); State Superintendent of Public Instruction; Justice of the Wisconsin Supreme Court; Court of Appeals Judge (District 2); Waukesha County Circuit Court Judge (Branch 1); Waukesha County Circuit Court Judge (Branch 4); Waukesha County Circuit Court Judge (Branch 6).

The following State of Wisconsin Referendum, is shown on the back-side of the ballot: (Vote YES or NO)

"Photographic identification for voting. Shall section 1m of article III of the constitution be created to require that voters present valid photographic identification verifying their identity in order to vote in any election, subject to exceptions which may be established by law?





"Lights Out Elm Grove" Will Help Migrating Birds By Birders of the Grove

Spring signals the welcome return of our feathered friends as they migrate north to their nesting grounds. Elm Grove is both a destination and important waystation for migrating birds. Our woodland neighborhoods and abundant backyard feeders provide food and rest, and the pond at Village Park is an important stop-over for many different species of waterfowl.



Many birds do their migratory flying at night, when the winds are calm and the threat from predators is less. Traveling at night can be hazardous, however.

The bright lights of an urban area can cause birds to become easily disoriented, resulting in deadly collisions with buildings and other structures. It is estimated that hundreds of millions of birds are killed each year in North America due to light disorientation.

"Lights Out Elm Grove" is an annual initiative to help birds navigate safely through our community during migration. This voluntary program encourages residents and businesses to dim or turn off non-essential outdoor lights during the peak migration period of April 15th to May 15th. During this four-week period, homeowners and businesses can minimize outdoor lighting by doing the following:

- Turn off exterior decorative lighting
- Extinguish spot and flood-lights
- Turn off interior lighting on higher stories
- Down-shield exterior lighting to eliminate horizontal glare and avoid all lighting directed upward
- Install automatic motion sensors and controls wherever possible
- When converting to new lighting, assess the quality and quantity of light needed. Avoid over-lighting with newer, brighter technology.

"Lights Out" is an Audubon national effort to protect migratory birds. Many communities, particularly those along migratory flyways, have adopted the program. Please consider participating in this annual "Lights Out" initiative every spring and fall. Whether Elm Grove is a final destination or a respite stop on a continuing northbound journey, our little friends deserve safe travels.

Village Update

No matter how long the winter, spring is sure to follow! For a Village of our size, it is remarkable how many exciting initiatives we have underway and I am

excited to share a

progress update as the weather is beginning to warm and we prepare to "hit the ground running" in April.

So, grab a cup of coffee, sit back, and enjoy all the latest news and happenings. Here's to a vibrant and joyful spring ahead!

• Highland Pedestrian Pathway Construction Update:

As you have probably noticed, the new segment of pedestrian pathway on Highland Drive from North Avenue to Gebhardt Road is completed absent one critical item, the pathway crossing at the Canadian Pacific / Kansas City Railroad (CPKC) Tracks.

The Office of the Commissioner of Railroads (OCR) in Wisconsin is a state agency that oversees the regulation and safety of railroads. The OCR issued an order on October 10, 2024 mandating the pedestrian crossing be installed and that the Village and the railroad complete their respective portions of the work by May 31, 2025. The Village's engineering firm and the construction contractor have been working with CPKC to review the engineering design for the crossing and to obtain permitting from CPKC. Unfortunately, communication with the CPKC has been slow, however we still anticipate the crossing to be installed before the May 31, 2025 deadline.

• Caroline Heights Occupancy Update:

Occupancy of the Caroline Heights development has begun on a phased, building by building basis. Currently, two of the four buildings have received occupancy (the eastern most apartment building and the former Notre Dame & Maria Hall). The estimated "Final Occupancy" date when all buildings will be completed is June 30th, 2025 although this could certainly change. The Village Board continues to monitor the multi-family development activities on a quarterly basis and review the twenty-one new single-family home applications as they are submitted. Currently, four new singlefamily homes are under construction and an additional eight are expected to begin construction in 2025.

• Single-Family Home Water Lateral Installation Update: Cornerstone One has begun coordinating lateral installation directly with home owners who are eligible and have elected to connect to the new municipal water source. It is anticipated installation will begin sometime in late April.

- Underwood Creek Daylighting Update: Stantec Engineering and the Village have established a targeted bid advertisement date of April 22nd with a four-week advertisement window and bids will be opened on May 20th. We are now entering the finalization phase of several items including the Park and Shop parking lot redesign, permitting through the WDNR and FEMA, and 90% engineering plans. The Project Drawings are available on the website: www.elmgrovewi.org
- 2025 Pedestrian Pathway Construction **Update**: Engineering and design of the 2025 Village pedestrian pathway segments is now entering the 90% plan drawing phase. At a recent Committee of the Whole meeting, the Village Board reached consensus that all identified pathway segments designed for 2025 construction should be fully funded. This was in light of an updated estimated construction cost that came in higher that what was originally budgeted. The three pathway segments will all serve as a safe route to elementary schools. These include: Underwood River Parkway (San Fernando Drive to Hollyhock); Juneau Boulevard (Legion Drive to Crescent Drive); Gremoor Drive (Legion Drive to Fairhaven Boulevard).
- Welcome to Ethan Sowl: The Village is fortunate to have our new Assistant Village Manager / Zoning and Planning Administrator, Ethan Sowl! Ethan joins us from Riverside, IL where he spent the last four years serving as a Management Analyst. We are thankful for Ethan's arrival and look forward to his positive contributions.
- Village Clerk Recruitment Campaign: Yes, it's true, Katie Panella has accepted the position of Clerk at the City of Waukesha. We are thrilled for Katie to be taking the next step in her career, yet saddened to be losing a great colleague. The Village will be conducting our first review of applicants on April 4th and we are very optimistic with the candidate pool to date! Let's face it, it is not easy being a municipal clerk, but Elm Grove is a wonderful community to provide this noble service in.

It moves in the night This formless creation No problems of foresight For no destination


A mute born in hell This unhuman being For savage from hunger It strikes without meaning


Its victim is helpless No chance for escape Not even to hide Could stop the sure fate It strikes with no warning From high in the sky It lights on its prey If not, it would die

Things You May Not Know **About Your Village Recycle Center** By Richard Paul, Jr. - Village of Elm Grove Public Works Director

Your village recycle center, located at 900 Wall Street, not only provides a service to village residents, but also fulfills state and local laws prohibiting placing yard waste in regular trash or recycling bins. In order to help assist you during your next visit, here are a few fun facts that you may not know. When in doubt, simply ask the attendant present!

Piles -- There are only two piles for yard waste drop off—please be sure to place what you bring into the correct pile. All woody material should be placed into the branch pile for shredding, while all other compostable yard material goes into the other pile. Dirt, sod, fill, concrete, and asphalt are not accepted. Pile locations change based on the time of year and the space needed. Please be sure to *not* place any invasive species or non-compostable items in any pile (see below).

- Single Sort Recycling Overflow -- Have a party and your recycling container is overflowing? There is a container at the yard that you can place all of the same materials you put into your blue recycling can at home. Be sure to break down cardboard.
- Used Motor Oil -- Used motor oil and filter are accepted at the recycle center for proper disposal. Please be sure to check with the attendant to assure proper protocol being followed.
- Textile recycling -- There is one textile recycling bin outside the police station, and another at the recycle center. Please bag all items as the large white bin is NOT water proof. If you notice this is full when you drop off—please call the number listed on front so that the contracted company can come empty it.
- Where Does it All Go? -- Brush and wood are chipped and kept on site for residents to use or get delivered (see below). Yard clippings and leaves are loaded in dumpsters and taken by JOHNS Disposal to Johnson Nursery in Menomonee Falls for composting. Consider leaving the leaves to break down in place or creating a compost pile—just be sure to keep leaves out of stormwater drains, ditches, and culverts.
- Staff -- Please be kind and helpful—be prepared to stop and show your ID. Did you know that our DPW staff conduct a brush pick-up three times each year? There are very specific rules so be sure to check the village website and mark your calendar when your area will be serviced. Additionally, you can schedule a special pick-up for a fee.
- Garlic mustard/invasive species -- Because all of the yard waste is composted, it is recommended that any invasive species that has the potential to go to seed NOT be included in the piles and instead be bagged and sent to the landfill with your regular trash
- Metal recycling -- Did you know you could bring metal to be recycled? Just be sure to check the village website for a list of acceptable and prohibited items. Let's keep these items out of the landfill!
- Wood Chips -- Free to pick-up or can be delivered by filling out the online wood chip/ mulch delivery form. Anyone wishing to have their trailer or vehicle loaded at the Recycle Center will need to complete a Hold Harmless Agreement in advance with availability of loading is based upon staffing and level of training of Attendant.
- Furniture -- All bulky items can be arranged to be picked up by our trash collection please see the JOHNS Disposal website for up to date details. Better yet—donate or give it away for free!
- Hazardous Waste -- No hazardous waste is accepted at the village recycle center, but Waukesha County has two permanent collection sites and four one-time collection events scheduled in 2025 with the nearest one being in Brookfield. Check the county website



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

Bring all your textiles that need a new home (old sheets, towels, rags, worn-out clothing, etc.). Make sure they're clean, dry and bagged.

Common Ground for the Common Good: Wisconsin Mothers Deserve Healthcare

Wisconsin women deserve better than the Wisconsin State Legislature is doing for them right now. The Wisconsin State Legislature needs to pass postpartum medicaid expansion, and the good news is—we have the votes to do it.



We are living in a world where it seems harder and harder to get political parties to agree, but here's a topic where we have found the common ground that serves the common good, where we have the votes and the governor's agreement to get the legislation signed into law, and yet we have not been able to finish the job. What's the holdup? Let's dive in.

I want to begin by commending my colleague and friend across the aisle, **Rep. Pat Snyder**. Rep. Snyder and I often agree, and we often share frustration that we aren't acting as a legislature on important issues. This is one of those times, and I am here to cheer Rep. Snyder on as he leads the way. This is not a moment to prioritize a partisan political win—it is a moment for the women of Wisconsin to get what they deserve.

Every single legislator who is eager to serve their constituents should be eager to link arms with their colleagues to get good work accomplished. That's what former **Rep. Donna Rozar** and I did last session with this bill, and what Rep. Snyder and I are doing this year. We share a common goal—that Wisconsin women have access to the postpartum healthcare that they need.

Postpartum medicaid expansion (AB 97 / SB 23) provides the critical healthcare that postpartum moms desperately need and deserve in the 12 months post-childbirth. We know that in Wisconsin nearly 50 women died in 2023 due to causes related to childbirth, and those are the postpartum deaths we know about. These deaths are largely preventable, and this extension from 60 days to 1 year has been shown to improve maternal outcomes. 48 other states that have already passed a version of this bill—only Wisconsin and Arkansas haven't.

(I just felt panic in my chest as I wrote that. So much is on the line. We have got to get this done.)

There is far more that unites us than divides us, and a mother's need for affordable, accessible, quality healthcare in the year after a baby is born is certainly not partisan. Cosponsorship of this bill demonstrates not only the bipartisanship on this bill, but also that we have the votes! Of the 33 Wisconsin state senators, 23 have co-sponsored this bill (14 Democrats, 9 Republicans). Of the 99 Wisconsin state representatives, 74 have co-sponsored this bill (45 Democrats and 29 Republicans). We clearly have the 17 votes needed to pass the Senate, and the 50 votes needed to pass the Assembly. So, why hasn't this been swiftly signed into law?

Last legislative session the Senate passed postpartum medicaid expansion 32-1, and the only dissenting vote is no longer in the legislature. Instead, the woman now representing that seat is a co-sponsor! So, we expect this to pass through the Senate unanimously. However, even with 66 co-sponsors last session (50 votes is the threshold to pass a bill), the Assembly was never allowed to vote on the bill. The Speaker controls what we vote on, and the Speaker opposes the bill, so he is refusing to allow for a vote. He seems to be following a similar course this session.

Is this how a democracy is supposed to work? Should one man be able to hold up a vote on Wisconsin women's access to healthcare?

We have done the work to find common ground for the common good. We have the votes. I urge you to contact the Speaker's office and let them know that you support connecting Wisconsin mothers with the healthcare they need and deserve, and to call a vote. Let's get postpartum medicaid expansion signed into law and connect Wisconsin women, and their families, with the healthcare they deserve. Together we can get this across the finish line.
