



# Village Update

Trust everyone is enjoying summer and the vibrant colors and wildlife around us!

\*Congratulations. The Fire Department is pleased to announce **Brian Naylor** as Fire Chief. Congratulations Brian on your promotion and thanks for your continued service!

\*Recreation Activities. The Great Elm Grove Campout will be July 29<sup>th</sup>. This fun family event will be hosted in the Village Park with advance sign-up required.

\*Cruisin' the Grove Classic Car Show. The 10<sup>th</sup> annual classic car show will be held on August 6<sup>th</sup>. Please stop in and admire these classics from years gone by.

\*Elm Grove Beer Garden. Third Space Brewing is open for business Thursday thru Sunday in the Village Park through early September. Stop in and check out their offerings and enjoy the beauty of the Park.

\*Resident Feedback. During July, the Public Works and Utility Committee began discussing the Transportation Fund priorities for 2024. The Transportation Fund supports the investment in bridges, roadways and pathways. Resident communication has been focused on Pathways and the need for safe access for walkers and bikers throughout our Village. The ad-hoc Pathways committee has been actively reviewing and prioritizing the planned pathways with a recommendation to complete one pathway a year for the next 2 to 3 years.

\*Committee of the Whole (COW) Meetings. I want to thank the Village Staff and Trustees for committing their time to COW meeting preparation and attendance. These meetings are typically three hours long and feature impactful open dialogue setting the direction of Village Staff on key long-range projects.

Trust everyone is enjoying summer and At the July meeting discussions were held on:


\*Municipal Water. Extensive discussion related to the upcoming municipal water project associated with the Mandel water main installation and how to leverage the on-site contractor for the benefit of residents. Final decisions on who is eligible to "hookup" during this phase and estimated costs for laterals to the curbside will be finalized in July. Letters will be sent to residents and commercial property owners impacted. Those residents opting to take advantage of leveraging the contractor installing the mains will need to make a commitment by the end of August, with payment to the Village by October 15<sup>th</sup>.

\*Transportation Fund Priorities. The Board is attempting to manage the critical needs for Pathways and address the deteriorating condition of our roadways, while being fiscally responsible. After extensive discussion, recommendations from Board were to prioritize the North Avenue to Gebhardt Road Pathway segment for 2024 (#1 priority of the ad-hoc committee and a \$550,000 commitment) and get cost estimates to extend this Pathway to possibly Victoria Circle North and further to Juneau Road.

As it relates to Roadways, current road conditions are ranked from 1 to 10, with ratings below 5 indicating a need to repair or replace before long-term costly damage occurs. The Board's recommendation was to address all level 4 and 4/5 roads in the Village at a cost up to \$800,000 in 2024. Additionally, the Board unanimously supports annual pathway investments going forward, utilizing the input from the Ad-Hoc pathway committee as a guide, while understanding the staff time required to supervise and manage these projects.

Speaking of Projects, let's review other projects underway, including:

\*Gebhardt Road reconstruction. The project will be under construction till



early September. Thank you to the residents impacted for their patience and understanding as this project is executed.

\*Caroline Heights (Mandel) Construction. Expectation is that construction will commence in the third quarter of 2023 after Mandel acquires the land. In recent discussions with Mandel, closing is expected in August. Updated financial information was provided to our third-party consultant and the Board has asked for financial due diligence to be performed and reviewed by the Finance Committee prior to closing. After the Project commences and the construction timeline is defined, more detailed updates will be provided. If interested in updates, please send your email to kgehl@ elmgrovewi.org.

\*Daylighting of the Underwood Creek. The Village received appraisals for the railroad land and other easements in July. A closed session was held in July to develop our strategy for next steps to acquire these land rights. Plan is to have the project defined and on the April, 2024 ballot for referendum approval.





# Our History: Remembrances of Things Past

#### WHATZZIT?

Anyone need a refill on their coffee? Hold that thought. Meanwhile, readers may pause to recognize the above photograph as a picture of the historic **Brookfield Junction passenger depot** at 2844 N. Brookfield Road. My father, **Karl Hauser**, took this picture in 1968 when the depot was 101 years old. (That's his 1962 Dodge Dart parked on the left.)

Built in 1867, the depot has been a landmark on Brookfield Road ever since. It served as the passenger station for the **Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway**. An earlier passenger depot, built in 1853, had served the **Milwaukee & Mississippi (a.k.a. Milwaukee & Waukesha) Railroad** and also housed the local stationmaster and his family. It was converted to a private residence when the 1867 depot was constructed.

The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul depot continued to serve passengers for the next century. By 1886, there were daily commuter trains to and from Milwaukee, eventually evolving by the 1940s to the Milwaukee Road's well-remembered "Cannonball" commuter run, which was discontinued on July 31, 1972 due to declining ridership. After that time, the old depot was used by the railroad for storage and kept under lock and key. (Elm Grove's old depot had been leveled by a freight train derailment in April of 1958.)

The Brookfield depot became the property of the Canadian Pacific Railroad system when it absorbed the remnants of the old Milwaukee Road. Canadian Pacific determined that the building was in disrepair, had no further practical use and was too close to the railway right-of-way to safely remain. This spurred some residents of the Brookfield village area, including members of the Elmbrook Historical Society, to begin a drive to have the venerable structure moved to the west side of the street and restored. After a couple of "false starts", this effort caught the attention of the Coffeeville Company, which has operated a coffee shop and confectionary in Jackson since 2016. Saving the old depot

## Images from Our Early Days By Tom Ramstack

If you have enjoyed a delicious meal at the "Silver Spur" in the village of Elm Grove recently, you might recognize this photograph. In earlier days, the inn was owned by **Charles Reusch**, who brought his family from Prussia to Brookfield Township in the early 1850s and built "The Elm Grove Hotel" in 1855, making it the oldest commercial building still standing in the village. Looking at the photograph, you will see, posed, the Charles Reusch

family along with 2 harness makers working out if their shop at the east wing of the hotel. So, don't be surprised if you get a slight whiff of leather the next time you dine at the Silver Spur, it may simply be the lingering spirits of two harness makers, hard at work, practicing their trade.

Tom Ramstack, an area historian and author, is the descendant of early settlers of Elm Grove. dovetailed nicely with the company's vision of historic preservation. The building was finally moved on November 4, 2021. Last month, a year-and-a-half of hard work, skill and patience finally paid off. Brookfield's Coffeeville held a Grand Opening celebration on July 24th and opened its doors for business. Elmbrook area residents now have another choice for a morning cup of coffee or an afternoon snack. Hopefully, those interested in the preservation of local history and appreciation of our shared heritage will give it a try.




### Beautification Committee Serves Community, Seeks New Members

Global Surveyor, and he has contributed to numerous projects since, including the 2020 Mars Perseverance Rover.



### Calling 911 from a Cell Phone vs. a Land-line

Elm Grove Emergency Services Recommendations

When you call 911 from your cell phone, the call is sent to a centralized dispatch center in either Waukesha County or Milwaukee County, depending on what cell tower picks up your call. Before the call taker can transfer your call, they need to determine your location for transfer to the proper dispatch center.

In most cases, the county dispatcher will not be familiar with landmarks and business locations by name, and they will need an exact address before they can transfer the call to our Elm Grove Dispatch Center.

We strongly suggest that you program our direct emergency line, 262-786-4141, into your cell phone to avoid delays in service for emergencies happening in Elm Grove.

Our dispatchers have intimate knowledge of our geography and are capable of discerning your location quickly, with limited information. When it is your emergency, you will want to be speaking to the person who is talking directly to the responding fire, ambulance, or police unit that is coming to your aid.

There are no changes to your current land-line 911 service.
All land-line 911 calls continue to be answered
by Elm Grove dispatch personnel.

He sadly passed four days later. None of the family members had the money to pay for a cremation (there was no

Reminder: If you have "children" age 18 and older, you no longer have legal authority to act on their behalf ......so you should have a Healthcare Power of Attorney and Financial Power of Attorney prepared for your children when they reach the age of 18 so that you may make decisions on their behalf should they ever be unable to make decisions on their own......at least until they have a significant other to name. It's a matter of being able to protect your adult children.

# **Report from Madison**

The legislature is currently in recess for all of July and part of August. I will regularly be going to Madison during the break, but more of my time will be spent in the area. If you'd like to meet with me, I'm happy to discuss anything you wish. We can grab a cup of coffee at a place of your convenience. Call my office at (608) 237-9113 to arrange it.

#### **Household Questionnaire**

In early May, I sent a questionnaire to every Brookfield and Elm Grove household. You may remember seeing it; many of you took the time to respond, and I thank you for that. Your responses have been entered and tabulated, and I thought you would like to get a summary of the results, with more details available on my website. (https://legis.wisconsin.gov/assembly/13/michalski/)

The first question was to determine constituents' priorities for legislative attention. Fix roads & bridges received the largest support at 22%. This was followed by funding to encourage economic development at 19%. Cutting taxes at 17% was third, and funding for K-12 Schools at 16% was fourth.

Your responses to the question about abortion availability was enlightening. The two extremes of "never" and "allowed up to birth" were nearly tied at 17% and 16%, respectively. Allowing abortion for the first 12 weeks (the standard in Europe) received the largest share of responses at 38%. That was followed by 29% of the respondents wishing to keep abortion illegal except in cases of rape, incest, or saving the mother's life.

The yes/no question regarding mandatory minimum sentencing of convicted criminals was a resounding YES, with 75% in favor. In contrast, the gun ownership question was more divided. 46% would like to see more restrictions

on gun ownership; 54% would like to see people's rights to own guns protected.

The two questions about whether critical race theory or gender identity should be taught in our schools produced very similar results. About 65% of the respondents want both subjects out of our schools, and only 28% think the two topics should be part of the school curriculum. The remaining 7% didn't have an opinion.

Thank you again for taking the time to respond to my survey. This helps me understand your opinions; the knowledge will allow me to respectfully represent you in Madison.

#### **State Budget**

Roughly a week after the Legislative bodies passed a budget, Governor Evers signed the budget into law with several impactful line-item vetoes.

Under the Legislative passed budget, the average income tax bill would have been reduced by about \$573. Thanks to Gov. Evers' vetoes, middle-income wage earners will receive a paltry \$36 income tax reduction. Gov. Evers' claimed that the Republican tax cut was for the upper class. That claim just rings hollow. Anyone making over \$27,630 a year would have seen a dramatic decrease. I wouldn't consider an annual income of \$28,000 to be upper-class.

You'll also be seeing a school tax increase on your property tax bill. The Legislative budget raised the per-pupil revenue limits by \$325 and also balanced that additional tax burden with a property tax credit. Through some tricky line-item vetoing, Evers managed to make this increase happen every year for the next 402 years, and he did it without including the balancing property tax credit! So, you will see this annual increase in your property taxes. The power of that line-item veto is shocking.




