# On the Ballot

### Election - AUGUST 13, 2024

The Official Partisan Primary
Ballot upon which Elm
Grove residents will vote
includes candidates for
United States Senator,
Representative in Congress
(District 5), Representative
to the Wisconsin Assembly
(District 13), District Attorney,
Waukesha County Clerk,
Treasurer, and Register of Deeds.



Page 2 of the two-sided ballot additionally asks for a vote in favor of or against the following referendum questions:

#### Question 1: "Delegation of appropriation power.

Shall section 35 (1) of article IV of the constitution be created to provide that the legislature may not delegate its sole power to determine how moneys shall be appropriated?"

#### Question 2: "Allocation of federal moneys.

Shall section 35 (2) of article IV of the constitution be created to prohibit the governor from allocating any federal moneys the governor accepts on behalf of the state without the approval of the legislature by joint resolution or as provided by legislative rule?"

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Voting can be in-person at Village Hall on certain days prior to the election, or on Tuesday, August 13 between the hours of 7 a.m. and 8 p.m., or by Absentee Ballot.

#### **Beautification Committee Receives DNR Award**

(ELM GROVE) On June 30th, the Elm Grove Beautification Committee's Invasive Species Task Force was presented a 2024 Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Invasive Crusader Award. The Wisconsin Invasive Species Council gives the awards to individuals or groups in professional and volunteer settings that positively impact the fight against invasive species.

The group started meeting in August of 2020, and meets nearly every Sunday at 11 a.m. Their work within the village has ranged from removing Garlic Mustard and Dame's Rocket in the spring to Buckthorn in the fall.

Speaking on behalf of the Beautification Committee, Nicci Sternitzky noted, "One goal of the group is to make our village park buckthorn free and maintain it. Want to join in the battle? Where has summer gone? It's already August and everyone's summer plans are in full swing. As always, please use extra care driving in the Village with road and building construction and families walking and biking in our community.

#### Welcome!

I would like to welcome Brain Lahey to the Village staff as Finance Director. Brian and his family plan to relocate to the area from Illinois. Brian has extensive governmental accounting experience over the last 7 plus years working for a professional services firm supporting several communities approximately the size of Elm Grove. Welcome to the team Brian!

Additionally, the Police Department welcomed **Jared Peterson** as a patrol officer. Prior to joining the team, Jared was with the Sheriff's department at the State Fair. Welcome Jared!

Committee of the Whole meeting July 29th. \*The Board continues to work on the plan for daylighting Underwood Creek through the downtown. A working session with the engineering firm and financial advisors will review actions to date and effort needed to draft referendum language, with an August 26<sup>th</sup> deadline.

\*Caroline Heights discussion will continue, including what access points are being used and the overall dust control on the site. Paving for impacted streets is planned for the end of August.

\*Comprehensive Village Plan and Future Land Use Plan will be reviewed with the goal to update these Plans that provide future development guidance throughout the Village.

\*Review of ordinances surrounding the Village's granting of Tax Incentives and the Public Works \$1 million dollar referendum limit.

#### Public Works Update.

The Public Works department is hard at work on many projects this summer, including the following:


\*Highland Drive culvert replacement has been completed. We appreciate the patience of residents and businesses during the full road closure.

\*Highland pathway update. Most work is complete except for the Railroad crossing. Hearings are set in Madison with the railroad commission in August.

\*Review of storm water on Highland Drive after installation of the pathway is continuing.

\*Paving will commence in August addressing the most-needy roads in the Village. Please be patient as this important improvement is completed.

\*The budgeted construction of a pole building on the Public Works site was reviewed and approved by the Board. The indoor storage of equipment will improve remember to hydrate often!



overall operations leading to extended service life of important assets. The total cost was in line with budget.

\*WE Energy outage updates and powerline burying projects. Please work with WE Energies outside consultants who are seeking your assistance to move this project forward. Without everyone's cooperation, the projects start date will be delayed.

#### **Recreation Activities.**

Huge thank you to all involved in the July 4th celebration. A very successful and safe event was enjoyed by approximately 1,500 attendees and included a fun run, open swim, food and beverages and fireworks in the Village Park. It was great to see the activities on the new basketball court.

The Comprehensive Outdoor Master Plan (CORP) is being launched in August. The CORP is a key document to apply for possible grants to help fund improvements. Stay tuned as this project moves forward in 2024.

#### **Public Safety Recognition.**

Throughout the year, our Police, Fire, EMT and dispatch professionals provide outstanding service to the Village and its residents. The Board wants to thank these professionals for their commitment to keep Elm Grove a safe and thriving community. Many residents have shared a personal story of how they have benefited from this team. Please join the Board in recognizing these fine team members!

#### Library items available for checkout.

Trustee Castile shared some interesting complementary experiences available at the library for checkout. These include Experience Passes for admission to the zoo, Harley Davidson Museum and other future locations. In addition, free day passes to State Parks are available while supplies last. Thanks to the Library team for coordinating these exciting opportunities!

#### Other Business.

The Board approved the use of existing ARPA funds to acquire a new VOIP phone system replacing a 25-year-old solution on its last legs. Various technology improvements are included in the new system to improve communications and productivity. 



# Our History: Remembrances of Things Past

### Elm Grove's Revered Blacksmith Family


In 1883, Charles Francis Sanders, of Waterford, Wisconsin, came to Elm Grove, were he soon opened a wagon and blacksmith shop along the Watertown Plank Road, at the east end of the village. On November 25, 1890, Charles married Catherine Gebhardt, of Brookfield, at the Catholic Church, in Elm Grove. The newlyweds soon took up residence in a rather small white framed home on the northwest corner of today's Church Street and Juneau Boulevard, in the village. The couple would raise 10 children in this home. A videotaped interview with several members of the Sanders family was conducted in 1985. I paraphrased and documented much of what was recorded in that interview, presenting it below.

Charles and Catherine's oldest son, John, age 10 in 1905, recalled: "We had a hog, pigs and a cow. I milked that cow every morning. When we were kids, we used to tramp along the railroad tracks, about 2 miles north, to visit our grandmother, Margaret (Brendal) Gebhardt, at her family's farm on North Ave. She was born in Bavaria and spoke, mostly, German ('Boarisch'), but some English, too. One day, we decided to place our little sister, Etta, age 5 in 1910, up on our horse, as we 3 older kids walked along beside, and again, headed off to grandma's house. This time, however, our horse had one of his hoofs jammed under the railroad tracks. I fell into a panic, as trains, more than one per hour, passed over those tracks. My brother, Charles (Jr.), age 13 in 1910, and I, struggled, and were finally able to pry the horse's shoe off, dropped it onto the ground, and backed the horse away, before any train arrived.

John went on, "Father learned much of his blacksmithing skills from another Elm Grove blacksmith-Martin Jewert. Next door to his blacksmith shop, father had a second building—a wagon shop. Inside, he mostly repaired wagons and buggies. But he built wagons, too! He had sharp planers which he used to smooth out ruff wood. While planing, large, curled shavings would fly up in the air, landing in large piles on the floor. I really don't remember too much about the wagon shop. Father shut it down, pretty much before I came along. I guess he didn't get much business once they began making wagons cheaper in Milwaukee."

Thereafter, Charles Sanders re-focused his energies into the workings of his blacksmith business. His shop had a large bellows, which blew concentrated air, heating his coal filled forge. John recalled his father teaching him the fine art of rhythmically, "tap, tap, taping" his hammer onto the anvil.

"Our father never shod horses," John declared, "he would bring in a farrier, who

cleaned the hoofs, shape the shoes, and nailed them onto the horse's hoof. The Manteys, Reinders, Marxs and other kids would crowd together at the front of the shop to watch him work. I remember how annoyed the farrier would get when all those kids began cramming inside. Eventually, with a big fist, he would angrily shoo them back out of his way."


John went on: "Our family, like most other Elm Grove families, at that time. were Catholic; attending the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary's spacious church, located next to the School Sisters of Notre Dame's (S.S.N.D.) convent. Father Haverstock was our parish priest. He had this big black dog who scared me to death. Whenever I stopped at the rectory, that dog would jump all over me and lick. I was an altar boy and served as a candle carrier at mass. Our parish church bells rang every day, at noon, signaling father to say the Angelus (a traditional Catholic prayer)."

John's sister, Etta (Sanders) Reinders, age 10 in 1915, reminisced: "'Christkindl' (Christ Kringle) came to our house every year on Christmas Eve. I remember, too, our sister, Mary, playing on an old player piano, gifted to us from the nearby Dixon School. We didn't have radio yet, so that player piano was our only entertainment. One year, we taught mother how to play cards—skat, rummy, and 'Shafkoft' (Sheep's Head). Our older brothers attended school at the S.S.N.D. convent, having 2 classrooms, taught by convent nuns. Before World War I, our classes were taught both in English and German. Terry Robbins, the Reinders and Pfister families, and others, all attended that school. The nuns who taught us were tough, but not really mean. At noon, we ran back across the plank road to eat lunch at our parents' home-John, making his favorite-scrambled egg sandwiches."



### Cruisin' the SPUR to be Held Twice in August



### Are You on the Monarch Milkweed Map Yet?

Your Elm Grove Beautification Committee has the goal of getting 300 orange dots on the map of Elm Grove this year!

#### How do I earn a dot?

If you grow any of the 12 milkweeds species that are native to Wisconsin in your yard, you earn an orange dot on the map. It's that easy!

#### Why does this matter?

Milkweed (the species Asclepias) is the only plant a monarch can lay eggs on. To help boost the imperiled monarch population we want to help spread the word about what each of us can do to help make a difference.

#### What else can I do?

Assure you have a variety of native plants for monarchs to nectar on, especially in the fall as they fuel up for the lengthy migration back to Mexico where they overwinter. Avoiding the use of pesticides is also important to assure a healthy population that can survive the arduous task of migration.





#### Have You Tried a Mosquito Dunk?

Got mosquitos? If you're thinking about a lawn treatment for these little suckers, there are great alternatives—like a mosquito dunk. A mosquito dunk uses a naturally occurring soil bacterium (Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis, or BTi), that produces toxins that kill mosquito larvae when they eat it. Available from local hardware stores, the doughnutshaped dunk is placed in standing water in a container in the yard (like a partially-filled 5-gallon bucket), and then goes to work for up to 30 days. According to the EPA, Bti does not affect people or other insects or wildlife, and is approved for use for pest control in organic farming operations.

#### Clever Clover is a Weed No More

Did vou know that clover was once valued in suburban lawns? In the 1950's Scotts sold a turf builder that combined grass and clover seeds. Though clover then fell out of favor back then, it's making a comeback as homeowners recognize its ecological benefits. Clover requires less water and less frequent mowing than grass, plus it chokes out other weeds and attracts pollinators. A blended grass-clover lawn is something to check out if you'd like a lawn that's less work to maintain. And, like mosquito dunks, clover lawns are a smart strategy to reduce the amount of pesticides running off our lawns and into our water.

Who's knocking it out of the park with blue-bin recycling in Elm Grove? Our neighbors at 725 Brinsmere Drive, 13900 Watertown Plank Road, and 1800 Wedgewood Drive East. #### The Negative Effects of Social Media on Teenagers

Awareness, Solutions Needed

exponentially in recent years especially among adolescents. In recent years, the use of social media has been associated with the increased risk of mental health issues. According to the 2022 Pew Research Center, about 95% of teenagers between the ages of 13 and 17 use social media. In 2023, a research survey found that the majority of teens (13 to 17) use YouTube, TikTok, Snapchat, and Instagram.


It is true that social media has helped to foster social connections between individuals with common interests or identities. However, teens ages 12-15, who use social media over three hours each day have twice the risk of having issues like depression and anxiety symptoms. Other potential negative impacts could be cyberbullying-related depression, harassment, self harm, and body image issues along with disordered eating behaviors, and poor sleep quality linked to social media use.

The excess use of social media has been framed as an analogous risk for teens and their mental health, which is similar to how drugs and alcohol has impacted teens. An article written by Kathy Katella from

Mental health problems have increased the Yale School of Medicine in 2024 has mentioned that exposure to social media has the ability to overstimulate the brain's reward center and trigger pathways analogous to addiction. Feeling the pressure to be "perfect" as portrayed on a tiny screen from a stranger can affect ones developing brain. The duration of use along with the type of content consumption can impair the daily physiological needs like concentration and sleep. Concerned about the negative impacts of social media use among teens, the U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy in the New York Times article wrote, "Why is it that we have failed to respond to the harms of social media when they are no less urgent or widespread than those posed by unsafe cars, planes or food". In June 2024, Dr. Murthy called for a warning label on social media platforms, which requires implementation by Congress.

> Advocacy and awareness are crucial, similar to how we campaign against junk food or substance abuse, requiring collaboration among social media firms, government, parents, and schools. Comprehensive solutions are needed to address these complex issues effectively.

### Calling 911 from a Cell Phone vs. a Land-line

Elm Grove Emergency Services Recommendations

When you call 911 from your cell phone, the call is sent to a centralized dispatch center in either Waukesha County or Milwaukee County, depending on what cell tower picks up your call. Before the call taker can transfer your call, they need to determine your location for transfer to the proper dispatch center.

In most cases, the county dispatcher will not be familiar with landmarks and business locations by name, and they will need an exact address before they can transfer the call to our Elm Grove Dispatch Center.

We strongly suggest that you program our direct emergency line, 262-786-4141, into your cell phone to avoid delays in service

for emergencies happening in Elm Grove.

Our dispatchers have intimate knowledge of our geography and are capable of discerning your location quickly, with limited information. When it is your emergency, you will want to be speaking to the person who is talking directly to the responding fire, ambulance, or police unit that is coming to your aid.

There are no changes to your current land-line 911 service. All land-line 911 calls continue to be answered by Elm Grove dispatch personnel.

# **Our History**

(Continued from Page 4)

John continues: "Father rode a bicycle from our place, up through Prospect Hill, in New Berlin, on his way to visit his parents at Waterford (in Racine County)." Charles Sanders' parents, **Joseph and Anna (Henningfeld) Sanders**, immigrants from Westphalia, Prussia, settled in Waterford during the 1840s—raising 6 children, Joseph being employed as a cooper.

John went on, "Later, my father, more conveniently, boarded the old interurban streetcar at Sunnyslope Road, in New Berlin, riding west to Calhoun Station (at Calhoun Rd.), where he departed to continue his journey, south, along the old 'Big Bend Road' to Waterford—about 27 total miles. Most summers, our family attended the State Fair in West Allis. We would spend the entire day wandering through livestock and poultry buildings, watch sheep being sheared, and saw large draft horses pulling heavy loads. Father would give each of us kids 5 cents to spend as we liked. He enjoyed watching the sulky races (harness racing) but I didn't care for that too much. The grounds were so thick with people you could barely walk. At night, we boarded the #15 streetcar, taking us home."

"Father purchased his first Ford Model T in 1910. He and Mr. Reinders were the first to own automobiles out this way. By 1915, I was working full time in father's shop. Not many of us around here went to high school, yet, in those days. As there weren't many cars, everyone, even adults, rode bicycles. During the summers, we rode our bikes to visit our friends over on National Ave., in West Milwaukee. Most of the fathers, over that way, worked down in the (Menomonee) valley. They used to call that part of National Ave., 'Silver City.' I don't know where that name came from." Milwaukee Magazine Website, 2024-- "The Silver City neighborhood gained its name from workers who manufactured trains for the massive Milwaukee Road Shops. They were paid in silver dollars and spent their wages at businesses along National Avenue. One day, a saloon visitor entered, saw tall piles of silver on the poker tables, and exclaimed, "Why, this must be Silver City!."

"On Sundays, we played 'ball' on our diamond down near the depot. My brother, **Joe**, age 15 in 1926, was a good ball player. He would take the padding out of his glove. (He didn't need it.) And rubbed oil into the pocket of his mitt to soften it. He could catch any ball hit in his direction. The Waukesha team was much better than ours. Whenever we played them, they would wallop us, scoring 20 or more runs to our measly 1 or 2."

"While working at in his blacksmith shop, most days, father would send my brother, Joe, across the road, to purchase a 'bucket of beer,' for a nickel, at **Ramstack's** place. Down near the tracks, lived the **Mitchell boys**. They were nice enough fellas, but they always seemed to get themselves into fights, particularly when drinking was involved. The Mitchells took charge of the Elm Grove train station, including the telegraph office. In 1916, we all hovered around outside the telegraph office during the presidential elections--when **Wilson** won. Our folks worried about us getting into the war in Europe. Wilson was

going to keep us out." That was not to be as soon enough, subjected to the draft, two **Sanders brothers, Louis and John**, found themselves in the thick of things in France, as the 'Great War' commenced.

I hold personal recollections of John and Joe Sanders as our family knew theirs quite well. By the 1960s, the bellows, which had heated the Sander's forge for so many years, had given way an acetylene fueled welding torch. One afternoon, in 1968, at age 15, dad sent me down to the Sanders shop to have a piece of metal bent. Being a shy kid, in a large and loud family, I was hesitant to go. I recall slowly and nervously meandering my way down the Plank Road, through the village, to the crossroads where the shop stood. Along the way, I gained courage from knowing that our Ramstack family and the Sanders were, somehow, related. I recall too, on more than one occasion, dad telling us kids, "Those Sanders are the most kind-hearted people you would ever want to meet."

As soon as I slipped inside a large, opened swing door, John, then 71, lifted the shield from his mask and asked what I needed. Holding the piece in my hand, I stretched it out to him, muttering something which must have been understood, as he took it out of my hands and went right to work.

While John re-lit his torch and while the acetylene popped, I had time to peer around the interior of the shop. It was almost too much to take in--horseshoes hanging from the rafters, all different sizes and lengths of tongs, old harness, chisels, wedges, planes, forms, wrenches, and hammers (all kinds and shapes), rags, nails, screwdrivers and screws. Everywhere I looked, tools of which functions I had no knowledge, were hung on the walls and rafters or, seemingly, haphazardly placed on any one of several workbenches. I was certain that each of these tools must be essential to completing some necessary blacksmithing task.

Atop and amongst all of these objects were thick layers of dust, grease, and grime. I supposed that all that layered soot must have been accumulated through years of hard work. Across the darkened shop, I could see Joe (then, age 57), sanding some metal piece under a small, darkened window. I had already been familiar with his strained, raspy voice, as he suddenly yelled something, which I couldn't make out, across the shop, to his older brother. I supposed, without being told by others, that the condition of his voice must have been, somehow, related to his work.

John quickly shaped my metal piece as needed and proceeded to lead me into his small office where I was to pay for his work. With a dull light beaming down from above, and grimy hands, he straightened out a small, smudged billing book. I asked, "How much do I owe?" He rubbed his forehead and, while taking his cap off, scratched the top of his head more than once. Then after a moment, responded, "Oh, give me a buck!" Kind hearted, indeed!






#### **SSND Announces Virtual Prayer Room for Peace**

#### SAFETY TIPS

- ))) Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- » Never leave your grill unattended.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

#### **CHARCOAL GRILLS**

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propage leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the scapy bubble test and there is no flame, turn off both the gae tank and the grill. If the leak stope, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If the flame goes out, turn the grill and gae off and wait at least 5 minutes before re-lighting it.




