Village of Elm Grove ----

Residents who wish to take an active role regarding current and future issues of importance to our community may want to consider running for a seat on the Board of Trustees next year.

Village Board seats up for election on April 2, 2024 include those currently held by incumbents Shawn Hillmann, John Schindler, and Jennifer Stuckert. The two-year terms for those elected will begin on April 16, 2024.

A Primary Election, if needed, will be held on February 20, 2024, with the Spring Election and Presidential Preference Primary set for Tuesday, April 2, 2024.

To qualify as a candidate, you must be a resident of the Village of Elm Grove for at least 28 days before any election, age 18 or older, and an eligible elector.

The first day for circulating nomination papers for office is December 1, 2023; 20-100 signatures are needed for all elected offices. A candidate may circulate their own nomination papers. A Registration Statement must be filed with the Village Clerk regardless of whether the candidate accepts contributions and/ or makes disbursements. The last day for filing nomination papers, Declaration of Candidacy, and Campaign registration Statements with the Village Clerk is not later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, January 2, 2024. Qualified electors of the Village of Elm Grove may sign as many nomination

Elm Grove's 2023 Trash Audit led by the Green Team was a ground-breaking initiative to understand and quantify Elm Grove's residential trash stream. Based on the data, we've introduced several programs including home composting services for food waste, and textile and plastic bag recycling that make it easier for residents to keep these items out of the landfill.



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

Friends Raise More Than \$100,000 to Benefit Children's Miracle Network

Every year in early November, groups of enthusiastic gamers take on the challenge of playing a myriad of video and other games for many, many hours, all to raise money in support of the Children's Miracle Network, an alliance helping hospitals around the country of which Children's Wisconsin is a part.

Locally, a marathon Extra-Life stream featuring The Friendly Goasts team (aka lead organizers **Greg Reynolds**, **Vee Laabs**, **Christos Passalis-Bain**) and friends began on the morning of Saturday, November 4. Twenty-five hours later the group had raised more than \$10,000, and after an anonymous donor tripled the first \$10,000, the result was an impressive \$30,000+. This 10th Annual marathon, plus the previous nine, make a decade of fundraising events that have raised a combined total of more than \$100,000 for this community.

Greg noted that over the last ten years our efforts have helped put Children's Wisconsin (CW) in the top ten fundraisers in the nation out of 100s of Miracle Network hospitals. That success is due to friends, family, and determination, pushing to do better for the kids every year. (See Children's Miracle Network – Page 3)


Winter has arrived in Elm Grove. With the ground covered in snow and the temperatures below freezing, new opportunities exist to fully enjoy the outdoors including sledding, snow shoeing, skiing and ice skating to name a few.

*Congratulations. Special recognition to the Beautification Committee led by Nicci Sternitzky for the team's work on the Monarch Butterfly Pledge. In November, Elm Grove was recognized as a Monarch Pledge Leader for 2023. In 2022, only 75 communities in the United States achieved this honor. Well Done! I know plans are underway to reach for the stars in 2024!

*Lights of Love. Please join the Friends of Elm Grove Library at Village Hall on Sunday, December 3rd from 3:30 to 5:00 p.m. to ring in the start of the holiday season and illuminate the village tree. Caroling begins at 4:55 p.m.!

*Snow Removal. Please use extra caution as winter and slippery roads become more the norm. The first time on snow use extra care when driving and allow extra distance for stopping and maneuvering around parked cars and pedestrians. Also, when snow events occur, please make sure to move all vehicles off the road to allow for efficient plowing by our Public Works team.

*Continued Appreciation for your patience. Many thanks to all residents, especially those in southeast Elm Grove. The installation of the water main from Wauwatosa continues to progress. The contractor has had challenges passing water quality tests which have delayed the project. It is anticipated that repaying will be completed in the next two weeks. Detour signs will be removed as this work is completed. Unfortunately, due to these issues, the laterals will not be completed in 2023 and will be finished in 2024. This



will cause some isolated construction activities along Watertown Plank Road again in 2024. I asked the project team to provide an update at the Board of Trustees meeting on November 28th and anyone interested can watch the recording of the meeting from a link on the Village website www.elmgrovewi. org included in the Village Board Meeting. The update will include dust mitigation implementation and review of construction vehicle traffic patterns.

*Support for Local Businesses. With the disruption of traffic and Watertown Plank Road detours, I would like to encourage all residents to keep our local businesses in mind as we shop during the Holiday Season.

*Recreation Activities for Winter. The winter activity guide was recently released. The guide includes many fun activities to explore and try something new. The guide also includes many helpful updates from staff members on departmental activities and hours of operation. One of my favorites is the recycling center hours! Additionally, the ice rink is under construction now and with the cold weather the team will be trying to lay down some ice soon.

*2024 Budget Update. The final budget as approved by the Finance Committee is on the Village website for review. The staff and department leaders worked extremely hard to finalize a budget that provides the expected high level of services, while being fiscally responsible for not only 2024, but for years to come. My sincere appreciation to the Staff and Finance Committee for a job well done! The whole village board held a public hearing on November 28th and took up final approval at the same meeting.

*Review of Village Road Conditions. The road ratings were completed in November and expected projects for 2024 were reviewed by the Public Works and Utilities Committee. The current plans are to commit \$800,000 for road work in 2024 in addition to a pathway from North Avenue to Gebhardt along Highland Road. These ratings are available for review as well as an expected 5- year plan for future projects.

Speaking of Projects, let's review other projects underway, including:

*Caroline Heights (Mandel) Construction. The project is underway with many construction trades on site. Any interested residents can access weekly updates on the project from the Village website.

*Daylighting of the Underwood Creek. The Committee of the Whole will be reviewing next steps on this project this month. Final Valuation reports have now been completed and discussions with CP Rail have commenced. Stay tuned - much to follow.

CW as an organization, too, has changed for the better, providing more advanced care and tools for professionals than ever before.

"After many years putting on these 25-hour marathons I knew the spotlight we shined on CW was important, but it wasn't until becoming a secretary in CW's sleep clinic that I saw their essential work in action," Vee said. "CW provides far more than medical care. They work to combat food instability, finding kids/families rides to appointments, making calls to families before/after treatment to ease their anxiety. In some cases, kids form lifelong bonds with their NICU pediatrician based on the quality of care they received. It's quite the thing when an eight-year-old survives a difficult disease and can shake your hand at 27 with much life ahead of them."

Marathon supporter Sara Murphy said that the fundraiser was "nothing major, just standard insane accomplishment, tremendous dedication and commitment, not just playing video games but doing PR and engineering and people management, wonderful people, (I was) honored to help."

"It's been an honor to work with Greg, Vee, and so many clever, compassionate, and determined friends over the years to put this charity stream on," Christos added. "We'd like to encourage fresh faces to plan their own fundraising events in the future; to reach out and build up your own communities. Even something as simple as playing games with your family for an afternoon can make an impact. Every dollar counts immensely and the care given back by CW cannot be overstated. We should all want a society that looks after those in pain, with uncertain futures, to bring kindness and dignity to all.'

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

Our History: Remembrances of Things Past

Elm Grove Methodist's Early Years By Stephen K. Hauser

Most village residents will quickly recognize the photo above as a picture of Elm grove's Community United Methodist Church at 14700 Watertown Plank Road. In those days, it was Community Methodist Church and only the sanctuary, pastor's study and downstairs community room had been built. As can be seen in this 1955 photograph, landscaping was also lacking. This was the church s originally designed and used, and any additions were then merely hopes and dreams imagined for the future.

The young Methodist congregation had begun meeting as a "mission church" in 1949 at Leland School on Sunny Slope Road. It was under the leadership of its first pastor, **Rev. Guy Nelson.** There were 63 original charter members. Fund-raising for a church building began almost immediately, after a short-lived (and half-hearted) attempt to buy the old Elm Grove Lutheran Church (now the Elm Grove Woman's Club). A beautiful 3 ¹/₂ acre site at the northeast corner of Watertown Plank road and Highland Drive was purchased in 1950 for \$6,000, a more formidable sum then than it would seem today.

Ground breaking for the new church occurred on October 10, 1954, and the first service was held in the sanctuary on October 16, 1955. Once installed in the new building, with individual memberships topping 500, an era of remarkable growth began. Rev. Nelson left in 1956 to begin duties as the Methodist Church's Milwaukee district superintendent, replaced by Rev. Marlin E. Smith. Two Sunday morning services were now required, and 250 youngsters were enrolled in Sunday school classes. In 1958, the eastern educational wing was added, something Rev. Smith remarked was "sorely needed". (My parents, Karl and Helen Hauser, joined that same year.)

pastor in 1963, and Rev. Thad Rutter, Jr. was named the new associate pastor in 1964, fresh out of seminary. (Thad was the minister in charge of my 1966 confirmation class, and would become a lifelong friend.)

By the fall of 1965, Sunday attendance had grown so large that three morning services were required, and additional chairs were still sometimes employed. By the end of 1966, the membership rolls had grown to include 546 <u>families</u>, plus another 151 families who had not formally joined but were regular attendees. New members classes were held five times a year. My own confirmation class that year contained 61 students.

Dr. Strong was appointed district superintendent of the Green Bay district of the Wisconsin United Methodist Conference in 1968, and Rev. L. Clarence Kelley was called to the church's pulpit to replace him. In the same year, the northern addition to the educational unit was completed. Rev. Rutter was called in 1969 to pastor St. James United Methodist Church in Appleton, and Rev. Stephen Foster answered the call as the new associate pastor. It should be noted that during these years the other Elm Grove churches -St. Mary's Visitation, St. Edmund's Episcopal and Elm Grove Lutheran - all experienced similarly impressive spurts of growth.

Time and space both fail me in attempting to chronicle the various pastors and associate pastors who served the congregation in later years. It is also regrettable that names of the many fine parishioners who had participated in the earlier years of the congregation cannot be included here, but there is one thing of which I am quite certain: If they could all contribute to this column, they would be happy to join me in wishing all *News-Independent* readers a very merry and most blessed Christmas!

Public Safety Reports

*NOVEMBER 17, 2023: Structure Fire: 630 Dunleith Circle, Elm Grove

At 1:20 p.m., Elm Grove Police, Fire, and Emergency Medical Services responded to a report of possible structure fire with smoke in a building. The building is a 4-family residential building assessed at \$631,000 with estimated damages exceeding \$150,000.

The first responding Police units and Fire Command arrived at 1:24 PM, noting heavy grey and white smoke. The interior of the building contained heavy black smoke and fire in one of the 4 units. Responding fire units extinguished the fire. Contractors were working on scene when the fire ignited. Three of the four units contained residents, all of which were able to exit the building on their own, with no injuries. One officer was transported to Elmbrook Hospital for smoke inhalation and later released. There were no other injuries reported.

The following agencies assisted Elm Grove Fire: City of Brookfield, City of Wauwatosa, City of New Berlin, Tess Corners, Village of Menomonee Falls, City of West Allis.

***NOVEMBER 10, 2023:** A 40-year-old Milwaukee man was charged in Waukesha County Circuit Court with **Burglary – Party to a Crime** resulting from a burglary that occurred in the 13400blk of Watertown Plank Rd between November 15-16, 2022. Officers received a complaint of a burglary to locked, enclosed, storage trailer in which entry was gained and over \$3000 in tools were stolen. After a lengthy investigation, Detectives were able to identify and arrest one of the individuals involved in this incident. The defendant was transported to the Waukesha County Jail.

***NOVEMBER 6, 2023**: A 50-year-old Elm Grove man was charged in Waukesha County Circuit Court with **First Degree Recklessly Endangering Safety, Strangulation, Battery, and Disorderly Conduct** resulting from an incident that occurred at 1:30 AM on Saturday morning. Officers received a complaint from a victim who reporting being awoken by his roommate, pinned to the floor and choked, before having a handgun pointed it him. The victim fled the residence and called 911 for help. Officers responded and quickly located the uncooperative suspect, taking him into custody. Officers conducted a search warrant and recovered evidence from the scene, including a loaded handgun.

Elm Grove Junior Guild Donates \$16,000+ to the Village of Elm Grove

Defibrillator, Police Camera, Electric Vehicle Fire Safety, and Movies in the Park among funded projects

The Elm Grove Junior Guild raises money throughout the year to support our mission of education, wellness and protection of women and children within and beyond our community. Every year, a portion of those funds is allocated to the needs of the Village of Elm Grove. We are overjoyed to be able to donate \$16,106 to the village in 2023, nearly twice our grant last year. Thanks to our generous local business partners, this wonderful community and the efforts of our members.

*\$3,400 Grant - Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) for Elm Grove EMS

This AED will serve as an important life-saving tool for the Police Supervisor squad car. Oftentimes, the Police Sergeant/ Supervisor may be the first or second responding officer to an EMS call. Early defibrillation is one of the most significant interventions in cardiac arrest situations. Having the proper equipment available will give first-arriving officers the opportunity to intervene prior to ambulance arrival, saving precious time.

*\$4,000 Grant - Flock Camera and Outreach for Elm Grove Police Department

With this grant, Village police will be able to add an additional Flock Camera, a license plate reader system that assists officers in investigating various types of crimes such as thefts, burglaries, robberies, and hit and runs. The camera also serves as a deterrent to those who are intending to commit a This grant will fund both a Single-Use Fire Blanket, which wraps the vehicle in order to take oxygen away from the batteries, and an Emergency Plug, which disables the power from the electric vehicle when on an accident scene. Additionally, this grant funds a Fire Hose Test Pump, allowing the department to safely test the fire hose for annual required inspections in house, rather than contract out for a 3rd party. Additional funds will support fire safety prevention materials for children in the community.

*\$1,000 Grant - Movies in the Park Summer Series

These funds will help cover licensing fees for free outdoor family movies at the Elm Grove Village Park for summer 2024. Broadcast on an outdoor screen and accompanied by popcorn and the stars, this movie series in the past has included Disney movie favorites and great summer flicks.

*\$800 Grant - Fish Pond Restocking for the Village Park

This program helps keep the pond freshly stocked with a variety of fish and feeder fish for local anglers and kids. This is especially good timing with the recent installation of the second fishing dock in the park, donated in honor of recently-retired and long-serving Village President **Neil Palmer**.

*\$556 Grant - Trees for the Village Park

These funds support the continued efforts to plant new trees, replacing the numerous diseased ash trees that have needed to be removed from the park over the past years.

*\$5,850 Grant - Electrical Vehicle Fire Blanket & Emergency Plug, Fire Hose Testing Pump, and Fire Prevention Training Materials for Elm Grove Fire Department

*\$500 Grant - Invasive Species Eradication Plan for Village green spaces

This plan will provide a report of the current invasive species situation and how to improve the situation, not only helping to beautify our Village, but to boost ecosystem health, assist stormwater management and increase pollinator (and subsequently avian) diversity.

Elm Grove Junior Guild Blood Drives Save Lives

Next Drive to Be Held January 1, 2024

Over the past three years, the Elm Grove Junior Guild has coordinated eight lifesaving blood drives. An astounding 380 donations have been given across these drives! Blood products cannot be created in a lab, so these donations are incredibly important. All drives have been partnerships with Southeast Wisconsin's sole supplying blood bank, Versiti Blood Center of Wisconsin. Additionally, Tonawanda Elementary, Brookfield Central High School, Elmbrook Facilities, and the Village of Elm Grove have provided the necessary space to host these drives.

The history of the Junior Guild blood drives began in early 2021. With many of the usual community-focused inperson events canceled, Guild leadership brainstormed specific ways we could make a huge impact. Luckily, Versiti Blood Center of Wisconsin has all of the infrastructure available to pop up on site to put on local blood drives. The Elm Grove Junior Guild recruits donors to come to the drives and volunteers for setup, teardown, and child watch during the drive. A number of volunteers are local tweens and teens who are too young to give blood themselves, but have shown up ready to watch kids, move tables around, and set up signs. It is amazing to see their budding volunteer spirit in action.

At all these mobile blood drives, Versiti staff collected many units of whole blood. Whole blood can be separated into three individual components: red blood cells, platelets, and plasma. Each donation then multiplies three ways to possibly impact three patients. If the 380 units collected across all our blood drives is multiplied three ways, that is an amazing 1,140 possible lives saved! Most donors at these drives were local Elm Grove residents; this is an amazing positive cumulative donation to our local hospital systems.

During the holiday season, blood donations often drop, putting supplies into an emergency need status. We hope to make an impact with our upcoming blood drive at the Elm Grove Village Hall Courtroom on New Year's Day 2024. Appointments are strongly preferred and are available from 8 am - 1 pm. 

Dogs and cats can get frost-bitten ears, nose, and feet if left outside during bitter-cold weather. Chemicals used to melt snow and ice can also irritate pets' paws – be sure to keep anti-freeze, salt, and other poisons away from pets.

- Test all smoke alarms. Do this at least once a month. This way you will know they are working. Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Test the alarms.
- · Plan two ways out of the home in case of an emergency. Clear driveway and front walk of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home.
- Make sure your house number can be seen from the street. If you need help, firefighters will be able to find you
- Be ready in case the power goes out. Have flashlights on hand. Also have battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries. Never use candles.
- Stay aware of winter weather. Listen to the television or . radio for updates. Watch for bulletins online.
- Check on neighbors. Check on others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows and doors. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open.
- Stay away from downed wires. Report any downed wires to authorities.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Use extra layers of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room. Turn them off when you go to bed.
