On the Ballot

Village of Elm Grove ---

Residents who wish to take an active role regarding current and future issues of importance to our community may want to consider running for a seat on the Board of Trustees next year.

Village Board seats up for election in April, 2025 include those currently held by Village President Jim Koleski and Trustees Tom Castile, Kristina Sayas, and Thomas Shepherd. The two-year terms for those elected will begin on April 16, 2025. These are volunteer / unpaid positions.

A Primary Election, if needed, will be held on February 18, 2025, with the Spring Election and Presidential Preference Primary set for Tuesday, April 1, 2025.

To qualify as a candidate, you must be age 18 or older, a resident of the Village of Elm Grove for at least 28 days before any election, and an eligible elector.

The first day for circulating nomination papers for office is December 1, 2024; 20-100 signatures are needed for all elected offices. A candidate may circulate their own nomination papers. A Registration Statement must be filed with the Village Clerk regardless of whether the candidate accepts contributions and/ or makes disbursements. The last day for filing nomination papers, Declaration of Candidacy, and Campaign registration Statements with the Village Clerk is not later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, January 7, 2025. Qualified electors of the Village of Elm Grove may sign as many nomination papers as there are vacancies for any office. Candidates' packets are available at Village Hall, 13600 Juneau Blvd.

School Board members serve three-year terms. These are paid positions. Those wishing to become a candidate and have their name appear on the 2025 Spring Election ballot must file all necessary forms at the District Office, 3555 North Calhoun Road, Brookfield by no later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, January 7, 2025.

Speaking of our snowplows, the November storm provided a good test run for all our equipment and crews and proved we are ready for winter.

The Friends of Elm Grove Library will be hosting the "Lights of Love" Tree Lighting celebration on December 8th starting at 3:30 p.m. Events include a visit from Santa, story time with Mrs. Claus and a magician! Caroling and the tree lighting ceremony will follow at approximately 4:55 p.m. with refreshments in the Village Courthouse after the ceremony. Volunteer Opportunity


Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (CORP)

The Recreation Committee has started the work on the CORP, and everyone can help shape the path forward and influence the next steps, including the future investments and direction of the Village, by sharing their input in upcoming meetings. The Village has hired the planning firm Vandewalle & Associates, to help lead this effort to benchmark the Village's current recreational assets to other comparable communities and to facilitate discussions.

Underwood Creek Daylighting Project

I would like to thank residents for their strong support in favor of moving forward with the Daylighting Project. Please know that your Village Board will be cost conscious in executing this project to deliver an aesthetically pleasing and quality result.

The Public Works and Utility Committee currently is focused on a couple of critical next steps. The Committee is working with its Engineering and Design Firm, Stantec Engineering, to finalize the Drawings. The Committee is looking to maximize the use of quarry stone banking on the north end of the project. This is a cost saving and aesthetic improvement. The Board is also finalizing its approach to acquiring the 2-plus acres of abandoned railroad land required for the Project. Additionally, staff and our consultants are working with the



also underway. The critical item now that the Project is approved is the land acquisition so our Engineers can do further environmental soil testing.

Public Works Updates

For those visiting the recycling center dropping off some leaves, a construction project may have caught your eye. There is a new storage building under construction that will house Public Works equipment that would otherwise be stored outside in the elements. The building will help improve the longevity and protect our investments in this equipment.

Unfortunately, the Highland Pathway was not able to be completed in 2024. We expect to receive final permitting from the Railroad over the winter and anticipate completion of the pathway in May, 2025.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee has been working throughout the Fall to finalize a 2025 budget. I want to thank the entire committee and Village Staff for the thoughtful work finding solutions to balance the budget. Led by **Brian Lahey**, our new Finance Director, the budget required significant give and take which meant all the requests could not be funded. I appreciate the cooperation by everyone in this challenging process.

As a reminder, the State limits the Village's ability to increase the levy. In 2025 the allowable increase was 1.04%. With wages and benefits increasing at a much higher rate, this presents a challenge. The Village Staff was creative in bridging this gap in 2025; however, going forward the Village may need to explore other ways to increase revenue to maintain its current high level of services for all residents.

The budget was approved at the November Village Board Meeting and your property tax bills will be arriving in December. Please be aware all tax bills must be paid directly to Waukesha County.



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
Local Drive to Benefit Homeless Community

'Adopt Your Drain' Project Needs Community Support

To quote Gill from Finding Nemo, "All drains lead to the ocean Nemo!", or in the case of Elm Grove...all drains lead to Lake Michigan!

Everyone lives in a watershed. Contrary to the name, a watershed includes both land and water and is named for the waterbody into which the rainfall hitting that area of land will flow. All Elm Grove residents live in the Underwood Creek tributary of the Menomonee River Watershed. Every time it rains, pollutants left on streets, parking lots, and lawns are picked up by moving stormwater and brought into nearby storm drains. This untreated water is then discharged directly into our local Underwood Creek and eventually into Lake Michigan.



SweetWater has recently added nearly 200 drains within Elm Grove to the Adopt Your Drain map. Visit: https://www.adoptyourdrain.com

Take a minute to check the map and see if there is a drain near your house or on your walking route. Just a few minutes a month are needed to keep your drain clear and report what you've removed, especially before and after rainfall events.

How quickly can we get 100% of the drains in our community adopted?



Elm Grove Birders Club Offers Citizen Scientist **Opportunities**, Activities

Do you love to watch birds, hear their sounds, learn about their behavior and environment? Do you want to help nature and support the habitat of birds? You can meet like-minded people by participating in the Birders of the Grove Club! We meet on the third Monday at 9 a.m., every other month (January, March, May, July, September and November). We have several ongoing activities such as helping our Village achieve "High Flyer " status, building upon our recognition as a "Bird City USA" (https://elmgrovewi.org/399/Bird-City-Wisconsin).



Our members have participated in several free citizen Science projects that anyone can join, such as these:

- The **Christmas Bird Count** is the world's longest running community science project, and started in 1900. This event runs from December 14 to January 5 every year, and involves the entire Western Hemisphere documenting numbers and species of birds in the Northern winter and Southern summer (www.audubon.org/ community-science/christmas-bird-count). Join some EG Birders on December 28th at 9 a.m. at the Village Park to walk the trail and count!
- Project FeederWatch is an annual citizen research study sponsored by the Cornell Ornithology Lab that gathers data on the numbers of individual birds in each species observed in your own home or other community location from November 1 to April 30. It does have a fee of \$18/year, which supports the analysis and interpretation of data. Other data collected include features of the environment (mammals, number of feeders, predators, plants, water sources, etc).
- The Great Backyard Bird Count is a worldwide effort to count and document bird species. This can be done as an individual or in groups. The dates for 2025 are February 14-17 (www.birdcount.org). Members of our club met and documented birds spotted at the Village Park in February 2024, including 30 Cedar Waxwings!
- The Great Wisconsin Birdathon is a statewide effort to document the bird species in Wisconsin. It is a fundraiser to support bird conservation through the Natural Resources Foundation. Participating groups or individuals count birds on any day(s) from April 15 - June 15, and request donations from friends and relatives that are based on the number of species counted (www.wisconservation.org/great-wisconsin-birdathon).
- World Migratory Bird Day occurs in the U.S. and Canada on the second Saturday in May, and will be on May 10, 2025 (www.worldmigratorybirdday.org). It celebrates the hundreds of species that migrate between nesting habitats in North America and nonbreeding habitats in Mexico, Latin America and the Caribbean. Elm Grove Celebrates this event with a Village wide festival for people of all ages in the Village Park.

We also have a goal to educate our community about important environmental efforts that impact birds and their migration, such as Lights Out (https://elmgrovewi.org/746/Birds-Lights) and Leave the Leaves (www.cbs58.com/news/leave-the-leaves-zoological-societyof-milwaukee). We'll be organizing several spring walks around the Village pond to identify migrating waterfowl (dates TBA).



Elmbrook Rotary Project to Help Bring Clean Water to Guatemalan Communities **By Doug Jacobson**

In the highlands of Guatemala, people washing their clothes in a stream is a daily task. As is carrying water in buckets from the same stream, sometimes for several miles, then gathering firewood to boil the water before it might be safe to drink. Disease from waterborne contaminants is widespread, and in some cases patients in hospitals are forced to bring their own water because the local hospital does not have clean water. Clean, safe water, a commodity we take for granted, is unknown for thousands of the proud, hardworking people of Guatemala.

Elmbrook Rotary Club is stepping in to help. Our International Services Committee will be leading a project in 2025 to bring clean, safe water to two communities in the Guatemalan highlands. Cruz Chich and Chumisa are home to 3,700 indigenous Mayan people who have never had access to clean water. Partnering with the people of these two communities, as well as the local Vista Hermosa Rotary Club, the Marquette University chapter of Engineers without Borders, the Rotary Club of Milwaukee, and other potential Rotary clubs in Wisconsin and elsewhere, we are on our way to raising the funds for this exciting \$260,000 project.

The initial phase of this project has already begun through the efforts of the people in the communities. The task is significant. Trenches must be dug, and pipelines constructed to bring clean water to the villages from a spring seven kilometers away. Storage tanks and treatment facilities will be constructed, and more than 400 connections will be made to individual homes. The people of these two communities, who are supplying some of the funding and all the labor, purchased the spring several years ago and now, with help from Vista Hermosa Rotary Club and Elmbrook Rotary Club, look forward to a day very soon when they will finally have clean. safe water available in their homes.

As indicated above, we are still in the process of raising all the necessary funding for this project and donations of any size will be greatly appreciated.



Post-Election Commentary from District 13 Assemblyman

On election night, during what I now call my "Dewey moment," the headline of the *Waukesha Freeman* reported, "Michalski retains Assembly District 13 seat". Then, at about 3 a.m., Milwaukee County's Central Count reported their tabulated votes. In what feels like a familiar theme, these additional votes moved my opponent ahead.

As I acknowledge my loss, I do not feel defeated. However, I do believe the Elmbrook community has suffered a defeat, shattered by the politically motivated redistricting initiated by the Wisconsin Supreme Court. The new 13th Assembly District was explicitly designed to be a 60% Democratic stronghold, and politically speaking Elm Grove has effectively become a part of Wauwatosa.

challenging Wauwatosa: rising taxes, increasing crime, and declining schools. These problems have emerged from mimicking Milwaukee's poor management, and our community is poised to face similar challenges.

Elm Grove, the home of the state's first woman Lieutenant Governor, Republican Margaret Farrow, is unlikely to see conservative leadership at the state level again in my lifetime. Much like Wauwatosa, which has changed drastically over the years, this defeat will profoundly impact our community, making Elm Grove hard to recognize in the not-too-distant future.

Reflecting on the past two years, I feel a sense of pride. My top priority was to provide more funds to local governments, and I succeeded by increasing District 13's State Shared Revenue by almost two and a half million dollars per year. I also had three bills signed into law, two of which fulfilled my commitment to voters regarding election security. I made it a point to listen to the community's concerns, fears, hopes, and dreams by welcoming anyone who visited my office and having coffee with many constituents at local District restaurants. The past two years have been an unforgettable journey. I am deeply grateful for the opportunity to have served as your representative.

I want to thank the many who have helped me along the way, providing me with their time, money, and energy. I especially want to thank my wife, Jennifer. She's been my rock for over 25 years, and I couldn't have done this without her. Lastly, I would like to make a request of Robyn Vining. You have previously represented a relatively small portion of Waukesha County, and you know that many people there have opinions that differ significantly from your own. As a result of redistricting, the number of conservative voters has grown substantially to nearly half of your constituents. Please take the time to listen to everyone, regardless of their views or ideologies. I hope you provide them with the support and assistance they need. Serve them well.

How to Recycle Amazon Packaging

It's the holiday season, when festive lights glow, neighbors say hello, and Amazon trucks abound around town. Amazon delivered nearly 6 billion packages in the U.S. in 2023. Spread evenly over a year, that's 16.4 million packages delivered per day—but we know it skews higher during the holidays.

If you want to reduce the amount of packaging coming to you this season, we have a few ideas. First, order less. Buying locally, giving experiences rather than material gifts, and e-gift cards are good alternatives. When ordering from Amazon, choose "ships in own container" when it's offered. And, if you're a Prime member, use the "Amazon Day" delivery option to have all of your eligible orders arrive together.

Here are some tips for recycling holiday packaging in our blue bins:

- <u>YES:</u> Cardboard boxes, padded paper mailers, and brown packing paper can be recycled in our blue bins. Be sure to flatten the boxes and remove the tape.
- <u>NO, BUT</u>: Take plastic bags, air pillows, and bubble-lined plastic bags to places where plastic bags and film are recycled, like Kohl's, Sendik's and Pick' n Save.
- <u>NO</u>: Bubble-wrap and bubble-wrap lined paper mailers can't be recycled. They go into the waste stream.

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


