The Village of Elm Grove's 70th Anniversary of Incorporation

Attention Elm Grove residents: THERE IS STILL TIME to submit nomination papers, Declaration of Candidacy, and Campaign Registration Statements in order to secure a place on the spring 2025 election ballot.

The deadline to submit these items to the Village Clerk is no later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, January 7, 2025. Stop by Village Hall, 13600 Juneau Blvd. or call (262) 782-6700 for details.

Village Board seats up for election include those currently held by Village President Jim Koleski and Trustees Tom Castile, Kristina Sayas, and Thomas Shepherd.

Of the above, Shepherd is the only incumbent who submitted a Notification of Non-Candidacy by the established deadline in late December.

By press time for this issue, **Village Clerk Katie Panella** confirmed that Koleski had already filed paperwork needed to seek reelection, and it was expected that Trustees Sayas and Castile would also file for reelection.

HAPPY ANNIVERSARY, ELM GROVE!

Elm Grove's official incorporation as a Village, on January 14, 1955, is a solid example of the old adage: "If at first you don't succeed, try, try again."

To understand the events leading up to this, we must take a look back to 1838 when the territory of Wisconsin (which became a state in 1848) was divided into 36 square mile townships. At that time our present-day town and city of Brookfield and village of Elm Grove were all part of the town of Brookfield, an area known as Milwaukee Woods. the following Village Officials: President – Kneeland Godfrey; Clerk – William O'Neill; Treasurer – Mrs. Lucy Sievert; Trustees – M.F. Beisber, Harry L. Kunze, George Happe, Edward Grede, William O'Brien, and L. N. Christiansen.

A news story appearing on November 16, 1955 stated that: "No village taxes will be assessed residents of Elm Grove next year, the village board has decided."

On January 28, 1963, Elm Grove's Assistant Postmaster, **Edward De Lano**, was quoted in the *Milwaukee Sentinel* as saying: "We've had home delivery since 1955. But people can't get out of the habit of coming to the post office. They like to talk and read the bulletin board."



Robyn Vining Vining to be Sworn in as Assembly District 13 Representative, January 6th

In the wake of her victory in the November 2024 election, Democrat **Robyn Vining** of Wauwatosa, who represented State Assembly District 14 for the past 6 years, will this month assume the District 13 seat held for the past 2 years by Republican **Tom Michalski**, of Elm Grove. Vining will now represent constituents in Elm Grove; a western portion of Wauwatosa; and an eastern part of Brookfield.

Rep. Vining says she looks forward to meeting more local residents, and plans to hold office hours during January at the Elm

age 18 or older, a resident of the Village of Elm Grove for at least 28 days before any election, and an eligible elector.

As verified by Village Attorney Hector de la Mora and conveyed to *The News-Independent* by Village Manager Tom Harrigan, State Statue 17.24 says, in essence: "If no additional nomination papers are submitted for a vacant Trustee seat, the Village Board may appoint, by majority vote, for the residue of the unexpired term, or until a special election is held."

To request a Rate Sheet & Reserve Space contact: elmgrovenews@yahoo.com (262) 782-6193 Until the late 1920s, when a few subdivisions were developed, it was primarily a farming community. In 1939, an attempt was made to incorporate Elm Grove, but failed.

After World War II, many veterans and their families moved here from Milwaukee. Amid concerns that this area might be annexed to Milwaukee, Elm Grove tried again to incorporate as a village in 1953. That attempt was invalidated because a required legal notice had not been published in the town's official newspaper: *The Elm Leaves*.

A 16-square-mile section of the town of Brookfield was incorporated as the City of Brookfield in 1954--- and, finally, in 1955, Elm Grove gained its status as a village.

The 1955 *Elm Grove Directory*, published by the Elm Grove Woman's Club, noted

In that same issue, Village President **Harry L. Kunze** made comments about Elm Grove that are as timely now as they were then.

"One answer why this is such a good place to live is the good government participation we have by our citizens," Kunze said. "Our community is quite active in many things. Our work is carried on by the trustees and a large number of committees whose citizen members are volunteers."

Village Update

The trees are looking wonderful as they are covered in snow as I write this article.

It is time

to get out and



experience the fun

activities winter brings to the Village.

I know **Logan Kein**, Recreation Manager, is watching the forecast to flood the ice rink as soon as possible. As always, please drive carefully as stopping quickly is a challenge these days. After the snow, a huge thank you to the Public Works team for clearing our streets for the Friday morning commute.

Village turns 70! The Village will be celebrating its 70th Anniversary in January! Once part of the 36 square mile Town of Brookfield, the Village was officially incorporated on January 14th, 1955 and has mostly retained the original municipal boundaries.

The Village has worked hard to retain its "small town" charm and urban/rural atmosphere that so many cherish. In fact, due to our excellent public and private schools, high median home values, great police, fire and emergency services, the Village is consistently ranked as one of the best places to live in Wisconsin. Please take a moment to reflect on the Village's past by viewing the historical photos highlighted in the January Newsletter emailed to enrolled residents and included elsewhere in the newspaper. Here is to another great 70 years!

Village Property Taxes and User Fees. Everyone received their Property Tax Bill in December and after a few years of good news, taxes rose in 2024. The Property Tax Levy in 2024 has many moving pieces, including the revaluation of home values that happens every other year. On average home values increased 16% in 2024. However, the tax rate in the Village went down by 13%, which resulted in roughly a 2% (\$85) increase in taxes paid to the Village. User fees for sewer, waste/recycling and stormwater increased by \$47 to \$1,191 or 4%. All in the taxes controlled by the Village to fund its operations increased roughly 2.35% on average. Total property taxes increased at a much higher rate driven by the approximate increase of 13% (\$600) for Elmbrook Schools, 12% (\$28) for WCTC and 6% (\$77) for Waukesha County. While everyone's Property Tax Levy will vary based on other factors, I wanted to share this overview to highlight the changes in 2024 property taxes.

Public Works Contracting. The Village Board and various committees have been discussing the contracting limit that was approved by referendum in April 2022, setting a \$1M cap. The limit applies to all contracts for road, sewer, stormwater, pathway and other infrastructure projects which occur annually in the Village. After extensive discussion over the past six months and recognizing the general increase in cost and potential water main projects, if supported by neighborhood petitions, the Board voted 6 to 1 to increase the spending limit to \$2.5M with an annual increase for cost of inflation per published data.

Planning Commission Discussion. The Planning Commission and Village Board have been discussing the Future Land Use Map for the Village for the past six months. Various public hearings have been held to seek input and comments from residents, school districts, religious organizations and businesses. The Commission has recommended that the Future Land Use Map be amended to indicate that current institutional land designations be changed to single family use, in event the current use is discontinued. The objective is to indicate the future use will be to increase single family homes and not some other commercial development. This will not impact the current landowners or the use that is enjoyed today. Village staff is currently reaching out to those property landowners impacted to review the proposed Village action. A future public hearing of the Plan Commission will be scheduled once discussions are completed.

Caroline Heights (Mandel) Construction. Mandel was in front of the Board in December and reviewed project activities. It is expected that the first building will achieve occupancy in February. Leasing activities are ongoing and about 70 of the 237 units have been leased to date. In February, the Board will begin discussing the borrowing required to support the \$8.6M financial incentives included in the March 28, 2022 Development Agreement.

Daylighting of the Underwood Creek. Public Works Committee received 90 percent complete drawings in December. Review will be taking place and any final design changes will be discussed over the next two Public Works committee meetings.

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Our History: Remembrances of Things Past

The Path to the Village of Elm Grove's Incorporation By Stephen K. Hauser

All of Elm Grove was originally part of the 36 square mile Town of Brookfield, extending from County Line Road (now 124th Street) on the east to Town Line (Springdale) Road on the west. The Town's northern border was Lisbon Road and its southern boundary was Greenfield Avenue. Elm Grove, like Goerke's Corners and Brookfield Junction, was an unincorporated settlement within the Town's perimeters which had developed its own localized identity over the years.

Early organizational meetings to study Elm Grove incorporation were held at Leland School on Sunnyslope Road, at the American Legion Post 449, at Sezon's Cat'n'Fiddle tavern on Bluemound Road, and in the homes of various Grove residents. Originally, Elm Grove's village limits were to include the properties south of Bluemound Road adjacent to Bishop's Woods. Charlie Stackpole, who worked on the original Elm Grove incorporation, later discovered that residents north of Bluemound had decided to exclude parcels south of the highway. He then joined in active efforts to incorporate the City of Brookfield, which received its municipal charter on August 8, 1954. (Stackpole is the only "founding father" who participated in both Elm Grove and Brookfield incorporation efforts). Of interest is the fact that Brookfield would actively oppose Elm Grove's separate incorporation efforts in the courts, believing that the village area should not become its own municipality.

In November of 1953, Elm Grove's first village elections were set for December 15, 1953, with voting to take place at Leland School.

The first candidate to publicly declare a run for a village position was attorney **Kneeland A. Godfrey**, who announced that he would campaign for village president. In addition, six village trustee positions were to be elected, along with the posts of treasurer, clerk, assessor, and justice of the peace. A village constable would also be sought. That search ended with the appointment of **Police Chief Theodore Fejnas.**

Along with the Town of Brookfield, some residents of the new village also opposed the impending incorporation. They organized a committee of several dozen members to plead their case. The group's effort would no doubt have come to nothing had not Waukesha County circuit court judge **Allen D. Young** ruled Elm Grove's 1953 incorporation invalid, as proper notification had not been placed in the *Elm Leaves*, the Town of Brookfield's official newspaper of record.

Elm Grove's 2,211 residents would have to wait awhile longer before becoming a village. Wisconsin state statute 61.075 stipulated that a new petition for incorporation could not be received until one year after a previous incorporation attempt had been rejected or overturned.




To forward to 1955 when the village of Elm Grove was incorporated, the primary motivating force in this case was the fear of annexation by one of two sources. The city of Milwaukee was pursuing a policy of rapid expansion in the mid-1950s under the leadership of **Mayor Frank P. Zeidler** (serving from 1948-1960) who had argued that the city was being strangled in its growth by "an iron ring" of suburbs.

It was only a remote possibility that Milwaukee's leaders would seek to cross into Waukesha County to attempt to add eastern portions of the Town of Brookfield to the city's holdings. A more immediate threat came from other residents of the Town of Brookfield, where leading citizens, such as **Rolland Ruby and Franklin Wirth**, were attempting to organize the town's more settled and suburbanized eastern portion into a new City of Brookfield. They counted on the population, businesses and property values in the Elm Grove area to be an important part of their new municipality.

Many Elm Grove residents felt differently, however. They believed that their portion of the town had a unique character and heritage all its own... and they feared that the cost of city services in Brookfield would result in higher property taxes and a bigger, more bureaucratic government. To be blunt: The village of Elm Grove was incorporated in 1955 to keep it from later being annexed by or being forced in some manner to become a part of the City of Brookfield. Others in Brookfield knew this full well, and rancor on both sides persisted for some years thereafter, with Franklin Wirth insisting at one point that Brookfield's fire department should not

As for Chief Ted Fejnas, his tenure in office was short-lived. His small office, located in the Stenz Building (now the **Kurtz Realty** building) at 13545 Watertown Plank Road, was cleared out, and Chief Fejnas found himself looking for new employment.

Incorporation would ensure legally established borders, preventing later annexation by any adjoining cities or villages. In the attempt to gain approval, the would-be new municipality would need to show proof of adequate population and land mass and a tax base sufficient to support delivery of necessary services (police and fire protection, waste disposal, etc.) at a cost comparable to or less that what could be provided by an established municipality, if one was already in existence. Part of the goal of such a process was not only to ensure financial viability, but also to limit the growth of additional units of local government within close proximity, thus avoiding duplication of services.

be expected to assist in battling fires in the Village of Elm Grove.

Nonetheless, Elm Grove was incorporated as a village of roughly four-square miles on January 14, 1955 with its present borders of North Avenue to the north, County Line Road (124th Street) to the east, Bluemound Road to the south, and present-day Pilgrim Parkway to the west. The boundaries then were basically the same as one sees them today, although a few stray parcels fronting onto North Avenue were added in the 1980s. It is interesting to note here in passing that an early effort to include the old Bluemound Heights subdivision south of Bluemound Road was aborted, even though some residents there had initially worked on Elm Grove's incorporation process. That neighborhood was shortly thereafter absorbed into the City of Brookfield.

- We continue to explore sustainability opportunities at the municipal level.






I will never forget the day I was told I couldn't do it.



Elm Grove's First Village Clerk: William J. "Pat" O'Neill

For those who lived in Elm Grove from to the mid-1960s. Leonard was one of the a familiar figure. The former professional entertainer had been born in Madison in 1902. He settled in Elm Grove in the 1950s with his wife, "Peggy", a former Ziegfeld Girl. In between, he enjoyed enough adventures to fill a couple of lifetimes.

the 1950s through the 1980s, Pat O'Neill was first employees of the village department of public works. The O'Neills and Sheehans were friendly, gregarious folks and soon had many friends in the village. Pat was elected president of the local Kiwanis club chapter.



polls. That event typifies the mischievous merriment with which Pat O'Neil met daily

Pat had journeyed west during the Great Depression of the 1930s, ending up in Hollywood as an actor playing bit parts in movies for M.G.M. In addition to his film work, he performed in several Broadway productions and joined the famed Ziegfeld Follies as a dancer. It was there that he met his future wife. Peggy was a chorus girl who later remembered Mr. Flo Ziegfeld as "the best boss a girl could have." After leaving the glamour of stage and screen behind, Pat and Peggy eventually made their way to Elm Grove and built a home on Lone Tree Road. Some may remember that Pat planted the young evergreen tree that grew for many years in the intersection of Lone Tree and Watertown Plank roads.

Peggy O'Neill's sister, Harriet, had married Leonard Sheehan, and they made their home on Florence Drive from the 1950s

When Elm Grove successfully incorporated in 1955, Pat O'Neill was elected village clerk. He was subsequently appointed to the position until he retired in 1984. (He had tried to resign in 1983, but the village board tabled his resignation until a replacement could be found.) During his time as clerk, Pat worked for little or no money. He did odd jobs around the village hall and grounds and served as a sort of ombudsman for residents with problems, complaints and concerns. He soothed many a ruffled feather.


During this time, Pat also kept a hand in the acting profession. He often donned red suit and beard to portray Santa Claus for a variety of advertising campaigns. His last film role was as a street dancer outside of Ray Charles' music shop in The Blues Brothers in 1980. The scene was shot in Chicago. Pat told me he had a ball in the part, but then added: "But I always do."

Pat O'Neill

Pat, Peg, Leonard and Harriet were friends of my family and were present at Christmas parties at my parents' home. I also recall Pat organizing the polling place for the 1962 gubernatorial election at Leland School. He took a break from his work and joined me and my fifth-grade friends in the school cafeteria. He told us a couple of jokes, ate half of my chicken sandwich, and went back to the life. He was truly one of a kind.

Pat passed away at home at age 89 on January 28, 1992. A Funeral Mass was held at St. Mary's Visitation Church. His Milwaukee Journal obituary noted: "Pat's twinkling Irish eyes will always sparkle in his friends' memories." Indeed.

Calling 911 from a Cell Phone vs. a Land-line

Elm Grove Emergency Services Recommendations

When you call 911 from your cell phone, the call is sent to a centralized dispatch center in either Waukesha County or Milwaukee County, depending on what cell tower picks up your call. Before the call taker can transfer your call, they need to determine your location for transfer to the proper dispatch center.

In most cases, the county dispatcher will not be familiar with landmarks and business locations by name, and they will need an exact address before they can transfer the call to our Elm Grove Dispatch Center.


We strongly suggest that you program our direct emergency line, 262-786-4141, into your cell phone to avoid delays in service for emergencies happening in Elm Grove.

Our dispatchers have intimate knowledge of our geography and are capable of discerning your location quickly, with limited information. When it is your emergency, you will want to be speaking to the person who is talking directly to the responding fire, ambulance, or police unit that is coming to your aid.

There are no changes to your current land-line 911 service. All land-line 911 calls continue to be answered by Elm Grove dispatch personnel.



Winter storms can happen almost anywhere. They can cause us problems. Know what to do before, during and after a storm. This will help keep you and your family safe from a winter fire.

- Test all smoke alarms. Do this at least once a month. This way you will know they are working. Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Test the alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the home in case of an emergency. Clear driveway and front walk of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home.
- Make sure your house number can be seen from the street. If you need help, firefighters will be able to find you.
- Be ready in case the power goes out. Have flashlights on hand. Also have battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries. Never use candles
- Stay aware of winter weather. Listen to the television or radio for updates. Watch for bulletins online.
- Check on neighbors. Check on others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows and doors. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open.
- Stay away from downed wires. Report any downed wires to authorities.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Use extra layers of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room Turn them off when you go to bed.
