'Final Spike Anniversary Steam Tour' Excites Train Enthusiasts

Multiple cargo and passenger trains pass through Elm Grove on a daily basis, but something decidedly unique and special, known as steam Locomotive #2816 "The Empress", sped down the tracks of our community on the afternoon of May 6 on a celebratory trans-national trip which departed Calgary, Alberta, Canada on April 24, travelled through U.S. states including North Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Missouri, Louisiana, and Texas, and is scheduled to arrive in Mexico City, Mexico, June 7, where it will be on public display.

once-in-a-lifetime celebrates the one-year anniversary of the history-making combination of 2 iconic railroads Canadian Pacific (founded in 1881) and Kansas City Southern (established in 1887) to create Canadian Pacific Kansas City (CPKC), the first and only transnational railway that connects Canada, the U.S., and Mexico.

"On April 14, 2023, we drove a ceremonial Final Spike completing that continental connection. We (are) proudly celebrating that historic railway moment with a tour starring the 2816, honouring our history and looking forward to an exciting future filled with opportunities for our railroaders, customers and communities," noted a CPKC press statement.

5 Charged with Money Laundering, Bank Fraud, Identity Theft

(ELM GROVE) The following statement was issued by the Elm Grove Police Department on May 23: "An astute bank teller at US Bank, 945 Elm Grove Road, Elm Grove and quick responding officers thwarted an interstate fraud and identity scheme involving offenders from 3 states.

On Wednesday, May 22, Jonathan Aponte, 29, from New York, Malik Robinson, 26, and Jairre Edwards, 25, both from Michigan, and Dawson Armstrong, 21, and Yoni Bourgeois, 27, from Milwaukee, were all charged in Waukesha County Circuit Court with Conspiracy to Money Laundering, Party to a Crime of Fraud Against a Financial Institution, and Identity Theft. The charges were the result of unauthorized bank transfers from a victim's account, production of fraudulent IDs, and 4 withdrawals totaling \$15,900.

Their crime spree came to a halt when a US Bank employee, who noticed odd behavior and unusual account history, suspected fraud and contacted police. The suspects fled the scene before officers arrived and Brookfield PD was notified that the suspect vehicle may be traveling in the direction of the Brookfield Square US Bank Branch. Brookfield PD officers located the suspect vehicle and suspects in the Brookfield US Bank lot where all five were taken into custody. Officers recovered the \$15,900 and multiple fake IDs.

Dawson had his initial appearance on May 23. Aponte is being held on \$100,000 cash bail and the remaining three are held on \$50,000 cash bail, awaiting their next court date on June 7th."

The investigation remains active and open and no further details were made available by press time.

Elm Grove Resident Appointed to Waukesha County Circuit Court

(MADISON) — **Gov. Tony Evers** has announced the appointment of **Bridget Schoenborn** to the Waukesha County Circuit Court – Branch 4. The appointment will fill the vacancy being created by **Judge Lloyd V. Carter's** resignation. Schoenborn will complete a term ending July 31, 2025.

"Bridget Schoenborn is a respected attorney who brings a breadth and depth of experience to the bench," said Gov. Evers. "She will be an excellent judge for the people of Waukesha County."

Schoenborn began her legal career in 2005 as a judicial law clerk in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Wisconsin. After three years, she joined the United States Department of Justice as an Assistant United States Attorney. During this time, Schoenborn prosecuted complex narcotics cases, crimes of violence, and financial offenses and received numerous awards, including Federal Prosecutor of the Year. In 2020, she became the asset forfeiture chief of the United States Attorney's Office, responsible for civil and criminal asset forfeiture at the state and federal levels. In her role as asset forfeiture chief, she has focused on seizing criminal proceeds involved in cryptocurrency money laundering, drug trafficking, and white-collar crime and restoring funds to victims of crime.

Schoenborn lives in Elm Grove with her family and is a graduate of California Polytechnic State University and the University of Wisconsin Law School. She has served as co-chair of the Criminal Committee

of the Eastern District of Wisconsin Bar Association, on the State Bar of Wisconsin Diversity Clerkship Selection Committee, and is active in the Elm Grove Woman's Club. She currently serves as secretary of the Elm Grove Police and Fire Commission.

"It is such a great honor to follow Judge Lloyd Carter as the sitting judge in Waukesha County Circuit Court – Branch 4," said Schoenborn. "I am grateful to Gov. Evers for his confidence in me. It has been my privilege to serve the United States, and I am eager to continue my public service as a Waukesha County Circuit Court Judge, where I pledge to support the constitutions of the United States and the State of Wisconsin, administer justice fairly and equally, and treat everyone who appears in my courtroom with dignity and respect."

Birding Backpack Available Soon at E.G. Library By Lisa Becker

Birding, commonly known as bird watching, is a great low-cost hobby that is accessible to everyone. All you need is curiosity and patience to get started. While a good pair of binoculars isn't a requirement, having binoculars certainly makes spotting birds easier. Also having a guide of local birds can help you identify what you are seeing.

Beginning birders will soon be able to check out a birding backpack from the Elm Grove Public Library. The birding backpack will include a pair of Vortex Optics Crossfire HD 8x42 binoculars, 2 pairs of BlueCabi 8x21 kids binoculars, a laminated pocket guide of Wisconsin Birds, and a notebook for logging any bird species that are encountered. The backpack was donated to the library by Birders of the Grove using proceeds raised during prior years' participation in the Great Wisconsin Birdathon.

Birders of the Grove is a local group of volunteers that works closely with the Village of Elm Grove to establish and maintain our community status as a Wisconsin Bird City with High Flyer Status and to renew its


The Board continues to collect and update residents willing to step forward and volunteer throughout the year, and as openings become available, we reach out to confirm interest. Please see the application form on the Village website.

Monica Hughes Retirement. The Board would like to recognize Monica's twenty-plus years of service to the Village as its Finance Director. Monica has made many significant contributions to the Village which will have a lasting impact. Monica was an excellent resource to lean on and I appreciate her answering my many novice questions about governmental finance. Happy Retirement Monica!

Committee of the Whole May Meeting.

The Board met on May 20th as a Committee of the Whole. These meetings are to discuss and give direction to the staff on ongoing activities within the Village in an open meeting format. Agenda items this month included:

*Underwood Creek Daylighting Engineering <u>Update</u>. **Stantec**, our engineering consultant, updated the Board on progress. An update on the railroad land acquisition and parking lot easements was provided. In addition, discussions were held on further work required including geotechnical and environmental investigations, retaining wall modifications and the impact of the railroad zone of train loading. Several key takeaways and actions were provided to staff and Stantec to advance this project.



*Capital projects to be funded by ARPA Grants. Staff made recommendations to fund a new phone system to replace a 20year legacy system, Crosswalk completion, security access to Village Hall and lighting at Village Hall.

*Public Works Project Limit. shared their views on the current one-milliondollar limit in place. Factors influencing the discussion were inflation in the last 2 years, possible upcoming water main projects, recent road and pathway quotes, the need for some level of checks and balance and the expectation of the community that Trustees will act in good faith and effectively perform their fiduciary duty. In addition, the Board discussed the desire to have resident input via referendum when significant cash incentives are provided to developers and future Tax Incentive Districts. Staff is researching other communities approaches to this topic and will update the Board.

Major Construction in the Village.

*Caroline Heights Project. The completion of the water and sewer mains and resident laterals continues. Having walked the area, I know the disruptions and closed streets are challenging. Village staff is actively working to minimize the impact and disruption.

*Culvert Replacement on Highland. Construction is expected to commence the week of June 10th. It is expected road closures will be required for about 2 weeks, weather cooperating.

*Highland Pathway. construction is in full swing. The base layer of stone has been installed. Pavement to follow after the stone has time to settle. Favorable quotes were received for the 2024 paving needed to address the deteriorating

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Our History: Remembrances of Things Past

Waukesha's Fox Head Brewing Company By Stephen K. Hauser

Back in the days when many Wisconsin cities boasted their own breweries, the city of Waukesha could claim two: Fox Head and Weber. The photograph above showcases the wily visage of "Headley the Fox", erstwhile mascot of Waukesha's Fox Head Brewing Company. He still looks out at traffic from the front of the old brewery's offices and bottling plant at 223 Maple Avenue, but he might not do so for much longer.

The brewery was founded in 1893 as the Waukesha Spring Brewing Company, producing beer brewed with famous Waukesha spring water harvested from two nearby springs. Soon, it became the Fox Head Brewery, named after its popular flagship brew. The main building, which fronted onto Grand Avenue, was quite an impressive example of late 19th century brewery architecture, but was torn down in 1968, six years after brewing at the plant ceased.

During the prohibition era of the 1920s, Fox Head had converted its own bottling lines to produce a variety of sodas and soft drinks and, if rumors are to be credited, also continued to brew a line of beer which was surreptitiously distributed to local clubs and speakeasies in violation of the hated 18th Amendment. In German dominated Wisconsin, local authorities often ignored such violations, leaving surveillance and arrest operations to federal agents of the National Prohibition Bureau.

After the end of Prohibition in 1934, Fox Head returned as a full-time brewery. producing varieties of beer under at least a dozen different labels. Fox Head beers were shipped throughout the Midwest, and as far as the east coast. Since the brewery was located alongside the tracks of the Chicago & Northwestern railroad, the 400 route year vigil of Headley the Fox as he gazes on was used to ship the beer to other states by boxcar, so "Fox Head 400" beer was born. The company even had its own fleet of boxcars emblazoned with the Fox Head logo and Headley's smiling face. A popular local brew, many taverns featured Fox head signs,


coasters and promotional items, and Fox Head memorabilia is much sought after by beer collectors today.

Fox Head merged its brewing operations with the Weber Brewery in 1958, and both brands were subsequently sold to the G. Heileman Brewing Company of La Crosse in 1962. At that time local brewing in Waukesha ceased. Heileman continued to brew Fox Head until selling the brand to the Pickett & Sons brewery in Dubuque, Iowa in 1974. Pickett discontinued the line sometime in the mid-1970s. By way of full disclosure, I should note that Fox Head was my beer of choice throughout my years in college and graduate school. The famed 28 bottle cases that were offered (33% more beer!) were a strong selling point, but Fox Head was certainly not a "budget beer". Heileman and Pickett both continued to use the old Fox Head recipe, and it tasted quite good.

The Fox Head office and bottling plant were utilized again from 1994 to 2001 by the Remington-Watson Brewing Company, a micro-brew operation that produced Watson's Ale in large growler-size bottles. My wife Janice and I had the privilege of touring the brewery in February of 2000 with co-owner **Dale Johnson**. We sampled some of their beers, and while they didn't remind me of Fox Head, I thought they produced a quality product.

Carroll University has now acquired the old Fox Head property on Maple Avenue. It stands as one of the few remaining vestiges of Waukesha's brewing history. Although full plans for the parcel are not yet set, the Waukesha city council has approved a new parking lot for Carroll's parking needs at the site. The old brewery office, built in 1934, may soon find its days numbered. The 90passing traffic along Maple Avenue may be coming to an end. I wonder if he knows.

Brookfield Wildlife Habitat Team Accepts Certification Challenge By Nancy Gloe

Kudos to Elm Grove for being Wisconsin's first certified community wildlife habitat, through the National Wildlife Federation! The Elm Grove Beautification Committee has issued a "tag-you're it" challenge to surrounding communities to do likewise. And Brookfield has answered!

The citizen-lead, Brookfield Wildlife Habitat Team and the Brookfield Park, Rec. and Forestry Department are working to certify Brookfield, Elm Grove's neighbor to the west. A big part of this initiative is to educate the public about the importance of creating wildlife habitat.

We have, for example, lost more than a quarter of North American birdlife since 1970. These findings were reported in the scientific journal, *Science*, by researchers at seven institutions. **Habitat loss is the biggest overall driver of bird declines**. Habitat loss occurs when land is converted for agriculture, development, resource extraction, and other uses. **Habitat degradation** is a second cause of losses. In this case, habitat doesn't disappear outright but becomes less able to support birds, such as when habitat is degraded by invasive plants.

The good news is that there is much that we can do to reverse this trend based on the decisions we make to manage our properties, including our homes, schools, businesses, places of worship and shared open spaces. Creating habitat involves things like planting native species, providing a water source, creating cover from adverse weather and providing places to raise young. It also involves sustainability practices such as reduced chemical use.

And numerous studies have found that exposure to nature has positive effects on human health, including:

- Reducing anger, fear and stress
- Lowering blood pressure, heart rate and muscle tension
- Improving attention, mood and sleep quality.

EGWC Celebrates 54 Years of Supporting Local Young Artists

The Elm Grove Woman's Club (EGWC) celebrated the 54th anniversary of its Art Scholarship competition with a three-day event, May 2-4, 2024. A total of 52 high school students from Brookfield Central, Brookfield East, and Brookfield Academy participated, each submitting two pieces of artwork for consideration. On May 3rd, a panel of professional judges convened privately to assess the artwork and select the winners of two senior \$2,000 scholarships and a \$500 grant for a student in grades 9-11.

On May 4th, the EGWC hosted an Open House from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., with more than 300 in attendance. During this event, those present had the opportunity to view the artwork and vote for the People's Choice Award, recognizing the

piece they deemed the best in show. The Open House also featured a chance for the public to meet the artists, fostering interaction between the students and attendees. Additionally, all participants were offered private portfolio reviews courtesy of volunteer judges from the Milwaukee Institute of Art and Design (MIAD).







Elmbrook Robotics Teams Represented at FIRST World Championships

Two Elmbrook FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC) teams and one FIRST Lego League (FLL) team competed in the FIRST Robotics World Championships in Houston, TX in April. Only three FTC teams were selected to represent the State of Wisconsin, and two of them were from Elmbrook: Rising Rhinobots (Team #16310) and GEarheads (Team #16460)! In addition, BEAST Robotics (FRC #2202) co-team captain **Noah Ren**, a Brookfiield East junior, was named one of ten Dean's List Award Winners at the World Championships for his exemplary leadership.

The Rising Rhinobots and GEarheads both qualified for the competition by winning the Inspire Award at the Wisconsin State Championships, with the Rhinobots taking first and the GEarheads taking second place. This was the Rising Rhinobots' first time to FIRST World Championships, and the GEarheads third time in 5 years, first as a FIRST LEGO League (FLL) Team in 2019,

then as an FTC team in 2022 and again in 2024.

FIRST Lego League team Alpha Geek (FLL Team 55696), composed of nine 5th through 7th grade students from Burleigh Elementary and Pilgrim Park Middle School, competed at the FIRST World Championships after winning the state title.

At Worlds, the GEarheads and Rising Rhinobots had great match play performance with their alliance partners and won 8 of 10 qualifying matches, and each placed 6th out of the 56 teams competing in their respective divisions! The GEarheads won the 2nd place Inspire Award (best all-around team) and were the 4th seeded Alliance Captain for the robot playoffs in the Franklin Division. The Inspire Award is the highest award bestowed on a FIRST Tech Challenge Team.

The World Championships hosted a total of 600 teams from around the world.

Man Arrested for Multiple Offenses




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
