Village Update

The Village Board on Monday, May 21 approved moving ahead with the plans and design for a **splash pad** at the Village pool to replace the kiddie pool. The splash pad has an estimated cost of \$570,000 and will include a filtration system and will have approximately 20 separate features over the 1800 square foot splash zone able to accommodate up to 72 children at one time. It will also include shade structures benches and other amenities.

The Village Board authorized moving ahead with the understanding that fundraising would be initiated with the goal of getting commitments for a possible construction between fall 2018 and spring 2019 to be open for use next summer. Horizon Development is well known state developer of senior housing with a very good reputation. They have several projects in the region. The proposed 75 unit apartment building, with underground parking is designed with 3 and 4 story sections. The site is zoned B-3 Mid Rise Office and Professional where multifamily housing can be granted through a conditional use permit. The development will be seeking a conditional use permit and inclusion of the property into the existing Emerald Woods Planned Development Overlay. If those permissions are granted, the two projects together would have a density of 19.75 per acre in the PDO which allows a density of 22 per acre. The project proposes to connect to the water system near Elm Grove Road at Bluemound. This connection might also enable Emerald Woods and Douglas Plaza to connect. Many details remain

on this effort.

The Village Board has hired SHE, a highly respected planning and engineering firm, to conduct the process of preparing a Master Plan for the Downtown. SHE will conduct public sessions for businesses and residents to gather information on how residents would like to see development or redevelopment occur. We all know our business sector has struggled. During last years' consideration of a multifamily development on the Reinders property many residents said they believed we should prepare a plan rather than considering individual projects. (We might be the only community in the metropolitan area without an approved plan.) To allow the time to conduct the planning process without the distraction and possible conflict of a development request the Village Board voted to place a moratorium on building permits for commercial structures in the central business district. The moratorium is in effect until November 20, 2018.

Past Times: I REMEMBER...

John Hanson, First President of the United States

Every school child knows, so they say, that **George Washington** was the first President of the United States. Actually, it's a bit more complicated than that. George Washington was the first President of the United States <u>under the U.S.</u> <u>Constitution</u>, inaugurated in New York on April 30, 1789.

But before there was George Washington, there was John Hanson of Maryland. A few readers may recall that on November 5, 1981, the U.S. Post Office issued a first-class stamp commemorating his one-year tenure as a U.S. President. This prompted a brief flurry of newspaper articles and feature stories, including those in the *Milwaukee Sentinel* and *Milwaukee Journal*. In the three decades since, little more has been said, although Hanson's name occasionally pops up in discussions among those who pursue the obscure and the trivial.

The founding of the United States as a sovereign nation is generally fixed at July 4, 1776, when the Declaration of Independence was voted and signed in Philadelphia. What was our form of government in the intervening years between that event and the adoption of the U.S. Constitution in 1789 and George Washington's subsequent ascent to the presidency? This intermediate period is often neglected in classrooms and text books when America's early years are studied. It may well be American history's most under-covered era.

On November 15, 1777, the Continental Congress approved the Articles of Confederation, our first governing document as a free nation. It has been described as creating a "loosely buckled" national alliance between the original thirteen states, and marked the first time that the new country was officially designated as "the United States of America". The completed document was now sent to the various states for debate and ratification.

During the next four years, the articles were examined and argued and eventually approved by the several state legislatures. All the while, the Continental Congress continued to function without a charter, led by a President of the Congress (similar to a modern-day Speaker of the House). After Maryland became the last of the necessary states to approve the Articles on March 1, 1781, the Continental Congress became the Congress of the Confederation, America's first truly "legal" national government. colleagues who wished to speak and called for adjournment at the end of the day. In addition, he signed proclamations and pronouncements on behalf of the Congress, received foreign ambassadors and visiting dignitaries, and performed the ceremonial duties relevant to his titular position. During the year in which he presided, Congress oversaw the creation of the War department, the U.S. diplomatic corps, the department of the Treasury and the U.S. Land Office, which established rudimentary western territories.

In November of 1781, President Hanson signed the first Thanksgiving proclamation passed by the U.S. Congress. He also reported to Congress on the evacuation of British troops from American soil following the defeat of **General Charles Cornwallis** and his forces by Washington's Continental Army on October 19, 1781 at Yorktown, Virginia.

Interestingly, the position of president was something of an afterthought on the part of those drafting the Articles of Confederation. European envoys and diplomats were used to dealing with kings, premiers, and prime ministers. The idea of presenting their credentials or discussing delicate matters in a speech to a Congress seemed absurd to them. It became obvious that some presiding officer had to be able to receive foreign ambassadors and dignitaries who might wish to speak directly and confidentially in addressing a sensitive issue. Such matters often lend themselves more naturally to a private exchange. This realization led ultimately to Hanson and subsequent presidents under the Articles taking on these duties, as well as handling other such responsibilities on behalf of the Congress as a whole.

According to the Bicentennial edition of the Biographical Directory of the United States Congress, John Hanson was born on April 3, 1715 at Mulberry Grove, Maryland. He served in the Maryland House of Delegates and the Maryland State Senate until 1773, and was elected to the Continental Congress in 1780 where he became a signer of the Articles of Confederation. After his retirement from public life, he returned to Maryland to manage his family's affairs, dying at the Oxon Hill farm owned by his nephew on November 22, 1783.

John Hanson's selection as President was a political choice, not made because of any particular attributes, oratorical skills or personal strengths. His home state of Maryland had dallied and dithered over ratifying the Articles of Confederation for a variety of petty reasons, including a border dispute with neighboring Virginia. When the Maryland legislature finally voted to affirm, the selection of a Marylander to head the new government, at least ceremonially, seemed a good way to reward them for their belated acquiescence. In the final analysis, he was simply available, willing and able to serve. Much the same could be said of most of his immediate presidential successors under the Articles. Of course, this would also be true of some of our later chief executives under our present Constitution. The Articles of Confederation was specifically designed, after all, to create a limited federal government that would govern best by governing least. America's founders craved freedom, while the Articles and men like John Hanson attempted to assure that they would have it.

Article IX of the Articles of Confederation states that the Congress shall "appoint one of their members to preside, provided that no person be allowed to serve in the office of president more than one year in any term of three years". Accordingly, John Hanson, a wealthy planter from rural Maryland, was chosen on November 5, 1781 as "President of the United States, in Congress assembled", elected by his fellow congressional delegates. He served for the following year, concluding his term on November 3, 1782.

Of course, there was no Executive branch under the Articles. President Hanson was simply the presiding officer of the Congress, a unicameral (one house) national legislature of limited authority. He gaveled their sessions to order, recognized Although he served through stormy times and was surrounded by a swirl of momentous events, it could well be argued that there was little exceptional about President John Hanson or his one-year term of office. While he discharged his limited responsibilities with dignity, efficiency and devotion to duty, there is little to be said here of leadership, innovation or inspiration. Hanson had not been a leading figure in the Revolutionary War or in the negotiation of the ensuing peace treaty with Great Britain.

Donations are always needed, especially colored or patterned duct tape, cardboard



Pilgrim Park Math Club Excels at Competition



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D.A.R.E. Essay

This year I learned a lot from Officer **Brown** in our D.A.R.E. program. I learned things about drugs and alcohol that can change my life or save my life. I also learned a lot more about bullying. What I value most from the D.A.R.E. program is that I can and should be a leader when it comes to living a drug- and alcohol-free life. I also can and should be a leader with my classmates and friends when it comes to bullying. Bullying can hurt lives, too, and stopping bullying can save lives. I want to share a true story with you and hopefully it inspires you to stand up for the weak or the different kids, just like we learned from Officer Brown.

I want to tell you a story about my brother, Mikey, and his friends. It's not really a bullying story, it's more about making choices not to bully and how these choices are made. It was made by one group of boys and girls who had an impact that grew beyond their class. Eventually, everyone in Mikey's class, by choosing not to bully, served as an example for kids in other schools. These kids also chose not to bully, but to, instead, make a difference in Mikey's life, our lives, and their own lives as well. Everyone demonstrated the power friendship has over bullying.

Mikey is my brother. He is now a 14-year-old boy. However, he was born with a significant language disorder. As a result, he didn't even begin talking until he was about 5-years-old. When Mikey would hear people talking, it would get all mixed up in his head, and when he tried to talk, it would come out all mixed up. It took so much effort to listen or talk that he instead would choose to just talk to himself or repeat lines from his favorite tv shows. Sometimes he still does that and other times he just wants to be alone or just not talk at all.

So much of what we take for granted is so very hard for Mikey. That's why his behavior can seem different. If you didn't really know him, you might think he was strange. When kids meet someone who is different they often don't know how to treat those people. Other kids might see him as someone easy to make fun of or bully, all because he wasn't blessed with the ability to speak and listen the way we are blessed.

But, Mikey is amazing and, in so many ways, he is more blessed than we are. For instance, my brother Mikey has a great sense of humor. He loves to tease and be teased. He always wants to do fun things like chase or be chased. He is also very artistic --- he loves to paint pictures, make drawings, do sketches, and he is also getting good at computer graphics. He is also very sensitive about people's feelings. I remember when I was six-years-old, I lost my helium balloon and started crying very hard. Mikey said to me, "Don't cry Mary Gracie, I'll give you my balloon." Mikey's secret weapon is his sweetness. He is nice to everyone.

So, instead of staring at him and making fun of him and talking behind his back, Mikey's classmates took time to get to know him. They were patient and compassionate with him as he was learning to interact with them. They kept inviting him to play with them on the playground and on their sports teams. Because Mikey is such a nice and fun person, he has become very popular at school. But what I find most amazing, is how Mikey's classmates have changed the way other kids from other schools interact with him.

For example, in 6th grade, Mikey's basketball team was playing for the championship. The coach put Mikey in the game with only 4 minutes to go and while they had an 8-point lead. With Mikey in the game, the other team narrowed our lead to only 4 points. Finally, his teammates got Mikey the ball and Mikey ran to shoot a basket. This is the cool part of the story. Not only did our team stop to let Mikey shoot until he made a basket, but so did the other team! All the parents on both sides were crying at the incredible kindness shown by all the players. And, almost as a reward, our team won the championship by 2 points!

I hope you have learned more about kindness from Officer Brown and our D.A.R.E. program. And I hope my story inspires you to make the right choices next time you are presented with a situation or a person you think is different. Don't be a bully, be a leader. Thank you, Officer Brown, for being a leader for us this year.

Estate Planning: Naming a Guardian for Your Children

Most of us never think about dying. But sadly, not all parents live long enough to see their children grow up. Sometimes the unthinkable occurs. If you pass away, what will happen to your children? Who will raise them?

If one parent dies, the surviving parent will usually have custody of the minor children as the natural guardian. However, if both parents pass away, then a Court will decide who will become guardian.

In its assessment, the Court will look first to the Last Will and Testament of the deceased parent(s), the document in which parents name their choice for guardian. It is important to understand, however, that although the parents have nominated the guardian in the Will, only a Court can actually appoint a guardian. The Court usually confirms the nomination of the parents with the understanding that this decision was not made lightly by the parents.

There are some instances, however, when the Court, based on additional information and recommendations by family and professionals, appoints someone other than the parents' first choice. For this reason it is important to nominate at least one alternate choice for guardian in the Will.

If neither parent had a Will nominating a guardian, the Court will look next to family members. Many times there is a clear best choice and both sides of the family agree. However, without a Will, the situation can be quite problematic. What if multiple family members step forward, each believing he or she is the best choice? This can result in a stressful, even bitter, prolonged and expensive guardianship proceeding difficult for everyone, particularly the children.

If you are having trouble choosing a guardian, pick someone "for now." It's okay to nominate somebody now that you will probably replace at some point. Children and relationships change, and your first choice of guardian may change over time as well. The important thing is that you have made your preferences known. However, merely telling others who you want to raise your children isn't enough. A guardian is only properly nominated when it is done in a Will. Naming a guardian is perhaps the last and best gift that you could give to your children and family members.


