The Village Board met as a Committee of the Whole on May 7 to discuss the Downtown Master Plan. Board members expressed support for scheduling an additional Open House session to receive public comment after the next version of the plan is issued. The draft final plan was expected by the end of May and will include changes reflecting public comments and Village Board input.

Comments on the planning process thus far have generally agreed that residents:

- *Want a clearer and more complete vision of what we are trying to accomplish
- *Want more opportunity to discuss the plan options
- *Are interested in evaluating expansion of the municipal water system
- *Are concerned about elevation of new structures in specific areas
- *Want more emphasis on connected walking and biking pathways
- *Want more food and retail in the Downtown area

What do nearly 84,000 pounds of paper and 2,500 pounds of food have in common? Answer: That is what the Community Shred event has produced since 2013 when Woller-Anger & Company, LLC began hosting the event to serve Elm Grove and neighboring communities.

SMV Students Win \$12,000 at eCybermission Competition

(ELM GROVE) Four teams of junior high students at St. Mary's Visitation school were awarded a combined total of \$12,000 in educational bonds for their excellent performance in the annual national eCybermission competition. The web-based science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) program—sponsored by the U.S. Army and administered by the National Science Teachers Association (NSTA) is designed to cultivate student interest in STEM by encouraging students in grades communities. Students worked with St. Mary's Science teacher, Kathy Biernat to complete their projects.

The 6th grade students swept the state with first, second and honorable mention winning teams with projects comparing aquaponics, hydroponics and soil grown crops. The 8th grade team won not only first place in the state, but were in the top three of the regional winners for their work. The students learned that formaldehyde particle board is poisonous but coconut husk pressed board is eco-friendly, not poisonous, and sustainable. This helps the environment because coconut husks would usually get thrown out, and formaldehyde is also bad for the environment. The question they answered through research and experimentation was, "Can coconut pressed board hold up to the same standards as formaldehyde particle board?".

"The remarkable projects submitted by these students demonstrate their commitment to tackling some of their communities' most daunting challenges. The U.S. Army is truly awed by the thoughtfulness and originality behind the ideas put forth by these students," Christina Weber, AEOP Cooperative Agreement Manager. "We are so proud of all the state winning teams for their hard work, dedication, and ingenuity in applying STEM to solve problems in their communities six through nine to develop solutions and create positive change in the world to real-world problems in their local around them," said NSTA Executive Director Dr. David Evans.



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Past Times: I REMEMBER...

The Value of Just Knowing

"How much money can you make by knowing this stuff?" The student who had just asked me this question was quite serious. He really wanted to know the monetary value of his American history lesson.

In an effort to live up to my campuswide reputation for bluntness, I told him: "There is no 'economic bottom line' to this course." I added, "Taking this class will probably not make you a penny richer, but it might provide you with a wider view and fuller understanding of the world you reside in today." Seemingly disappointed, my student walked away.

The above encounter, after a class in 1993, exemplifies one view of higher education held by many students (and others) today. Some have ceased viewing colleges and universities as institutions of higher learning and have come to see them instead as giant employment agencies.

Make no mistake. College graduates want and need jobs today just as much as they did back in 1981 when I first began my teaching career. They are right to expect that their courses of study will prepare them to be productive and self-supporting in their future lives. But that is not, nor has it ever been, the sole purpose of higher education. Instead, there are many things to be gained from a diverse college curriculum, not because of any material profitability, but simply because they enhance and enlighten one's appreciation of the intricacies of life. Coupled with this should be the sheer joy of learning and the internal happiness that come from "just knowing". Higher education should be like a good, thick steak with all the trimmings. Too many students deliberately try to maneuver around the allyou-can-eat buffet of a liberal arts education, never realizing what they have missed.

On another occasion, I counselled a student who was experiencing some difficulties with his studies. I suspected that his problem might not be ability but attitude. I explained that greater diligence needed to be applied on his part and a greater percentage of his day spent on study and review would be most helpful. I could sense his growing frustration as he listened to my advice, the gist of which I thought he had probably heard before from others. Fed up with my coaching, he finally blurted out, almost desperately, "Look, I'm not here to learn anything. I'm here to get a degree!"

This was what some might call a Freudian slip, defined by the dictionary as "an inadvertent mistake in speech or writing that is thought to reveal a person's unconscious motives, wishes or attitudes". In other words, this student had flatly stated what he was really feeling at the time. Of course, he immediately began to back-pedal, recognizing the utter contradiction of his words. "I didn't mean it that way," he quickly assured me, embarrassed at his own amusing (and somewhat refreshing) honesty.

"Of course, you did," I replied. "You're looking at your educational opportunities all wrong. You see your classes as a high hurdle competition that your professors are forcing you to endure before handing you a piece of paper which certifies that you have suffered enough. That kind of attitude will eventually create in you the belief that life is nothing more than an unpleasant chore. In the process, you will miss out on both beauty and opportunity." I hoped he would grasp the life lesson behind my words.

Those students who have come to me professing an absolute boredom with their college course offerings have placed themselves at an initial disadvantage. I like to assume a certain general curiosity about life. A fascination with the trivial is a part of the human condition. Those without it have missed something and could be considered to be most unfortunate. This is not to say that all people must find the same things to be equally interesting. It would certainly be a dull world if they did. Instead, it is delightful to see everyone search out something of the esoteric in some field of knowledge and revel in the specific expertise that results. Having worked alongside many experts over the years, I can attest that scholars take great satisfaction in making even small contributions to their fields.

American workers have endured recurring cycles of layoffs, unemployment and protracted job searches since the recession of the 1970s. These past problems should have taught us at least one thing: if all you possess in life are the skills and knowledge directly related to doing your job, then you don't really have very much at all. Traditionally, a liberal arts education has been able to 'fill in the corners' by supplying perspective. The defense of the liberal arts has usually revolved around the premise that such a university curriculum teaches a student "a little bit about everything". The cynic, however, responds "and not much about anything".

"And what's wrong with that?" is my confrontational rejoinder. Such an education exposes us to interests and ideas that we would have no familiarity with otherwise. I am definitely no astronomer, but what little I have learned about astronomy has been a blessing to me over the years.

This month, Elmbrook area seniors will be graduating from Brookfield Central and Brookfield East high schools, Brookfield Academy and other area schools. Many will enroll at their chosen colleges and universities in the fall. I trust that some of them already know that learning only begins with our schooling. Eventually, our entire world becomes our classroom. I hope that our students will be well grounded by their college studies. What they do after that is up to them.

Estate Planning: Top 5 Reasons for Updating Your Plan

1. A Change in Marital Status

A change in your marital status will require significant changes to your estate plan. If you've recently married, Wisconsin's marital property will now apply to the division and distribution of your estate upon your death. The resultant distribution may be far from what you planned. If you've recently divorced, then your estate plan should be updated to ensure that your former spouse is removed as a beneficiary and fiduciary, as well as any of his or her relatives.

2. A Change in Financial Status

A change in your financial status may also require a change to your estate plan. If you've recently won the lottery or received an inheritance, you should review your existing estate plan to ensure it meets the needs of your now larger estate. The same is true if your estate has declined in value. Does your estate plan still make sense in view of a lower net worth?

3. The Birth or Death of a **Beneficiary or Fiduciary**

If a beneficiary or fiduciary named in your estate plan has died, then you should update your plan to remove the individual's name. However, if your spouse has died,

then your plan may need to be completely restructured. On the other hand, if you or a beneficiary have adopted or had a child, then you should review your plan to ensure that the new child is included.

4. Moving to a New State

A move to a new state is one of the most overlooked reasons to update your estate plan. Every state has different law affecting the requirements for estate planning documents, and also the administration of those documents. This is particularly true of anyone moving to or from Wisconsin, as our Marital Property Law is unique.

5. The Passage of Time

If your beneficiaries were younger when you set up your plan, then as they get older you should assess whether they still need the protections incorporated in your documents. They may now even be ready to take on the fiduciary roles in your estate plan, such as power of attorney for finances and health care, or the Personal Representative of your Will. Your lives, and those of your beneficiaries and fiduciaries, are works in progress. Your estate planning documents should reflect the changes brought by the passage of time.

The grant will cover the cost of student advising programs for two scholars for a full-year. Grant: \$3,500.

Preschool Program provides reduced-fee or free participation for low-income families to the organization's preschool program, which provides preschool students with hearing loss a structured enriched language experience. Grant: \$5,000

*Life Navigators Family Support Program provides basic living needs, family support and crisis intervention for children with significant disabilities and their families. The grant funds in-home intervention and support, basic living needs. Grant: \$5,000

*Katy's Kloset needed a network update. This grant will support the organization's Medical Equipment Lending Library that takes in and loans out used or new medical equipment and supplied to those in need at no charge. Grant: \$3,147
