#### Elm Grove's Kanavas Landscape Management **Celebrates 50 Years of Service**

Getting to know Kanavas; a conversation with George N. Kanavas, owner and founder of Kanavas Landscape Management.

#### Why Landscaping?

I was inspired by my mother who was an avid gardener. I started helping her at a young age and my interest grew from there.

#### Did you go to school for horticulture?

Growing up, I was an enthusiastic student of horticulture, reading everything I could get my hands on. By the time I was in high school I could name practically every plant in the neighborhood and tell you what kind of care it needed. After high school, I graduated from MATC with a 2 year horticulture degree.

#### How old were you when you started your business?

I started out mowing lawns when I was around 12 years old...towing a lawn mower behind my bike. My mother saw the mower crash into my bike once too often and decided I needed a driver! So, in a way, she was not just my inspiration but my first employee as well.

#### When did you hire your first employee?

It didn't take long until I had more work than I could do myself. Customers also started asking if I was available for larger and more complex jobs such as planting, lawn care and landscape repairs. At first, I got help from my friends, but they weren't consistently available, so in 1974 at the age of 17, I officially started Kanavas Landscape Management. At that time the company consisted of 5 people including me.

#### What sort of resources did you have?

As I recall, between the 5 of us, we had 2 trucks and we operated out of a friend's shop on River Parkway in Wauwatosa.

#### And now?

We now have all the advanced equipment we need to get projects done right, including a fleet of 31 work trucks and a highly dedicated staff to keep everything running smoothly.



In 1982 we rented and later purchased the Juneau Blvd. property where Kanavas has operated from to this day. We're presently a mid-sized company; large enough to tackle ambitious projects but small enough to provide personalized care and attention to detail.

#### Your customer base has obviously grown over the years, but do you still service any of the properties you started off with 'back in the day'?

Actually, yes! In fact, there are quite a few 'generational' clients we've had the privilege of serving for decades. We're also extremely pleased to note that we enjoy a customer retention rate of approximately 90%.

#### What is your current role at Kanavas?

We've assembled a great team which allows me to confidently delegate more, but I still oversee the day-to-day operations of the company. I wear a lot of hats but am always available to employees and customers alike.

#### A lot of businesses don't last 50 days, let alone 50 years. To what do you attribute your success?

Hard work, perseverance, and dedicated employees all contribute to our success. However, none of it would be possible without our loyal customers.

#### What are the biggest changes you've seen in landscapes over the last 50 years?

There have been some especially exciting innovations in outdoor kitchens, water features, fire pits, night lighting, colorscaping and outdoor televisions; everything needed for relaxing or entertaining.

April election is fast approaching. Please be aware of the April election which is right around the corner. Your participation and vote is a bedrock right that everyone should exercise. As it relates to the Village, shortly after the election, volunteer committee opportunities will be open to residents to participate in guiding the direction of the community. ### Public Works and Utilities Committee \*Highland Road Activity ---

Design work continues on the Highland pathway and storm sewer culvert. The Pathway drawings are approximately 90% complete and were reviewed in February. We expect to issue bid documents in March to move these projects forward in 2024.

#### \*We Energies Updates ---

The January snow and ice event impacted many residents. The committee reviewed a current draft of We Energies long – term project map for the Village. Village staff will continue to meet with We Energies to monitor upcoming projects.

#### \*Underwood Creek Daylighting ---

Details of the Project Task timeline were reviewed in preparation for a future referendum. As shared previously, the project scope and detailed engineering drawings were not sufficiently complete to bring a referendum item forward for approval on the April Ballot.


#### \*Extended Recycling Center Hours

#### Administrative & Personnel Committee

In January, our long serving and talented Finance Director, **Monica Hughes**, informed the Village of her intent to retire in June, 2024. It has been a pleasure to work closely with Monica these last 2 years. I appreciate her personal commitment to the Village and its residents. Monica has regularly shared her experience and guidance to the Finance Committee and the Board to improve the finances of the Village and we will miss her.

In February, the Administrative and Personnel Committee approved the job description and salary range for the next Finance Director, including consideration of a Request for Proposal for Services in connection with the search. A posting of the Position will be made shortly, and please share this opening with anyone interested in this opportunity. These actions were approved by the Board of Trustees in a special meeting.



#### **Parks and Recreation Committee**

The Committee has been working aggressively to finalize the contract to replace the Basketball Court in the Village Park. This work will be completed in 2024 to revitalize this amenity in the Park which has outlived its useful life.

Additionally, the Committee has been drafting a request for proposal to complete a Comprehensive Outdoor Park and Recreation Plan ("CORP"). This Plan is the basis for quantifying all the recreation facilities within the Village and provide the capability for the Village to apply for grants to further expand the resources available to residents. This is a first step in the process and the team is excited to get rolling.

### **Comprehensive Downtown Master Plan Activities**

The Village is kicking off its update to the Comprehensive Downtown Master Plan. The Village applied for and was admitted to the Connect Communities program. As a result, the Village can utilize the resources of the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation ("WEDC") to help frame the project. A kick-off meeting was held on February 23<sup>rd</sup> which included a walking tour of the Village and a presentation from the WEDC to Village and business leaders. Please stay tuned for future updates as this project.

#### Caroline Heights /Mandel Construction

Mandel was invited to provide an update and progress report on the project at the February Board of Trustee meeting. Residents' questions presented to Trustees will be reviewed as well as the overall timing of work on the project. Of special interest is maintaining mature trees that are to be saved on the property. #### **#1.** Tell us about yourself.

#### \*Shawn Hillman -

My wife Stephanie and I are nineteen-year residents of the Village. We have two kids. I'm a practicing attorney.

#### \*John Schindler -

I grew up in Elm Grove. I'm a retired Hydrogeologist and Flight Paramedic, and I've been an active volunteer in our community for many years.

#### \*Jennifer Stuckert -

An Elm Grove resident for over 30 years, retired from medical sales management, I'm committed to protecting our vibrant community where we raised our children.

### #2. What have you contributed to the Board and our community during this past term?

#### \*Shawn Hillman -

We have a very talented, committed Board and I'm grateful to have contributed my legal and business background to the Village's recent challenges. I think my ability to analyze and ask honest but difficult questions have assisted us in making complex planning decisions for the community.

#### \*John Schindler -

I helped create the Sustainability Committee, and as chair of the Public Works committee have overseen more pedestrian pathways built along major arterial roads. As chair of the Fire and EMS futures committee I was able to assist in stabilizing the loss of Fire and EMS personnel due to the aging out of our workforce.

#### \*Jennifer Stuckert -

I'm thankful and honored to represent our residents. I serve as Chair of the Administration & Personnel Committee, the Legislative Committee, and the Pathways Committee and am a member of the Building Board and Planning Committees. I introduced concept of the Village Newsletter to enhance transparency and apply fiscal responsibility in decision-making.



# #3. What are the 2 most significant issues/challenges facing Elm Grove within the next 5 years? What solutions / improvements would you suggest?

#### \*Shawn Hillman –

It is really all about the budget – every issue we face is constrained by our very difficult budget limitations that have been exacerbated by inflationary pressure for materials and labor. A related, but distant second for me is the challenge in finding staffing in all areas – that covers general village government, emergency response, police and public works. We have to find a way to find and pay good people to provide services to the community. There are many desirable projects and initiatives we all would like to proceed on, but we need good people to make them happen.

#### \*John Schindler -

- 1 The development of our downtown. With Lake Michigan water being available to the downtown in the near future, development will occur. We need to manage this change and balance the needs and rights of both property owners and residents to ensure we have growth that positively affects the downtown area for decades to come.
- 2 Finding a long-term solution to the loss of highly trained senior personnel on EMS and Fire. As this is a nationwide problem, we have been in active discussions with surrounding communities to find a solution that is best for our unique Village.

#### \*Jennifer Stuckert -

First, my focus is on redevelopment of our downtown to enhance its character while preserving its unique charm. Under this umbrella, I aim to control density of new development, daylight the creek, supply municipal water to downtown, improve pathways, and preserve green space. I will continue soliciting resident input and encourage transparency to develop a plan on the Planning Committee to ensure we meet resident needs, preserve community vibrancy, and maintain its charm. Critical to this process is grant application and fiscal responsibility.

Second, I will maintain and enhance our outstanding public services (Police, Fire, EMS, Public Works, & Recreation).










### Our History: Remembrances of Things Past

#### "The Twin Stone Gates" on Bluemound Road

Every day, hundreds of Elmbrook area residents drive past imposing twin stone gates at 12600 Blue Mound Road on the southeastern edge of Elm Grove. Most folks probably don't give these silent sentries a second thought, but a few must wonder what they were originally for, and why they are still here. An answer requires the telling of a story nearly one hundred years old.

During the Prohibition era of the 1920s, Milwaukee restaurateur Sam Pick decided to open a "speakeasy", a lounge that served illegal beer and liquor to thirsty customers. The 18th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, ratified in 1920, made the manufacture, transport, import or sale of beverage alcohol a violation of federal law. This measure was particularly unpopular in Wisconsin, with an ethnic makeup dominated by Germans, Irish, Italians and Poles. Many were first- or second-generation European immigrants who served alcoholic beverages as part of life's celebrations, such as holidays, weddings, funeral wakes or even a good Friday night fish fry.

Sam Pick found a location west of the Milwaukee County line, two blocks inside of Waukesha County in the Town of Brookfield. Elm Grove and the City of Brookfield were then unincorporated portions of the township. Neither had a police department. Instead, the area was sporadically patrolled by Waukesha County Sheriff's Department deputies who could often be persuaded to look the other way when it came to the serving of illegal drinks. In fact, there were already a number of establishments all along rural Blue Mound Road doing exactly that with seeming

Pick, however, did not simply plan to build yet another tavern. Instead, he set his mind on erecting a nightclub and show lounge that would be the most beautiful entertainment venue in the Midwest. When he had finished in 1929, Pick's Club Madrid was exactly that. The entertainers were top-notch, the steaks were thick and business was good. Beer came from the (supposedly closed) Fox Head brewery in Waukesha and liquor arrived from Chicago. The infamous Al Capone, who owned a home several miles to the west on Brookfield Road, enjoyed several dinners at Club Madrid, as did some of his associates.

After the repeal of Prohibition in 1933, Pick's Club Madrid continued on as a local dining and entertainment destination. Local celebrities could often be spotted there, including entertainers Liberace, Hildegarde and band-leader Woody Herman. Local

baseball players, including Ken Keltner, Ralph Otto and Joe Hauser stopped by, as did various radio personalities, businessmen and politicians. That all came to an end on April 9, 1953 when a fire started by a short in a wire in a neon sign instigated a blaze that destroyed the huge building. Pick decided the cost of rebuilding would prove prohibitive.

The club's tall chimney remained standing, strong and secure, but the rest of the structure was in ruins, which remained on the property until developer Carl Rohm purchased the site in 1954. He built Sleepy Hollow Motel over the footprint of the club, utilizing the basement and sparing the towering chimney which he employed for his motel. He also spared the twin stone gates at the entryway. When the motel was later demolished in 2005, I contacted then-Elm Grove Village President Susan Freedy, requesting that the old sturdy gates be spared again. She quickly agreed, and today they guard the entrance to soccer fields and a parking lot, as well as a detention basin. I am glad they are still there, as they provide a unique character and a link to our past. If those stones could only speak, what a story they could tell.


On Friday, March 8, you'll find the best selection.



#### **Does Recycling Single-Use Plastic Bags Actually Help? By Deb Baesemann**

As your Elm Grove Green Team is learning, this is a complex question. By now you've seen the single-use plastic bag recycle bins in place around the Village. We have collected more than 700 lbs. of plastic! Our goal was to keep these bags out of our household recycling bins, trash, and environment. However, we have been astounded by the high volume we've collected each week.

Recycling plastic is an imperfect solution. Recycling gives us all the false sense that there's no harm. However, many plastic items are not actually recyclable, and the process of recycling can release toxic chemicals in the air. Plastic in the landfills ends up in our food and water. Therefore, making a real difference depends on reducing and ending our use of plastic bags. This means **Refusing** single-use plastic bags. If you already have some, **Reuse** them - at the store, around the home - the options are endless. But don't take more or buy new!

Bottom line - we encourage you to stop using new single-use plastic bags. Here's how you can do that:

- Say no thanks to plastic bags at store checkouts.
- Look for items that are not in plastic packaging. Grape bags, for example, are not recyclable.
- Keep your reusable bags in your car/ next to your door so you bring them when you shop anywhere.
- If you forget your reusable bags, fear not! Simply carry your loose items and remember your reusable bags next time.

Changing habits isn't always easy! But it's worth the effort.





#### Youth STEM Scholars

11th Grade – Brookfield East High School

Science is everywhere. It makes up every part of our living environment, including ourselves, which is why I believe that science should be a fundamental part of every child's learning experience. This belief led me to start Wisconsin's student-led organization called Youth STEM Scholars, a club dedicated to promoting STEM experiences to young audiences ages 5-11. Led by passionate high-school leaders, our club works with elementary-level children and conducts experiments such as balloon-powered cars, sustainable life rafts, and marshmallow towers. Through these various experiments, club leaders were able to incorporate scientific lessons such as buoyancy and sustainability in order to promote scientific discoveries on a deeper level. One of the organization's key targets is to bridge the gender gap in the STEM field and by promoting a welcoming and collaborative environment, both young boys and girls work with one another to develop experimental designs, and efficiently hypothesize and carry out solutions to problems.

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
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
