

Municipal Referendum

(Vote "Yes" or "No")

"Shall the Village of Elm Grove complete the Stormwater Management Plan developed in response to severe flooding by daylighting and realigning Underwood Creek south of Watertown Plank Road through the downtown area? The existing creek enclosure located under the Park and Shop parking lot and the Sendik's building is failing, and will not receive permitting for significant repair from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources or the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The Village will acquire land and easements and construct a naturalized streambed for the purpose of Village stormwater management. This project will protect public safety, create public space, connect pedestrian pathways and enhance the economic viability of the downtown. The project will be paid for with funding from Tax Incremental Financing District #2, existing storm water fees, and grants. The total project cost SHALL NOT exceed \$8,500,000." 

Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (CORP)

The recreation committee has started the CORP plan, and next steps include meeting with key stakeholders and an online survey. The Village is always looking for interested residents to participate and help shape the future investments and direction of the Village. Please reach out to Village Hall with any input or interest in participating in the Plan development. A community meeting will be scheduled as the Project is nearing completion in 2025.

Referendum on the November 5th Ballot -Underwood Creek Daylighting Project

I would like to thank residents for sharing questions with Trustees and Village staff related to the referendum on November 5th. I would like to share a summary of frequently asked questions:


*Why has the cost increased to a not to exceed total of \$8.5 million?

The total cost includes acquisition of land and easements, restoration of the existing box culvert and construction costs. Beyond the inflationary impact expected, soil contamination concerns (cost increase of \$2 million) were highlighted initially by our engineering firm. Once land is acquired from the railroad, we may see this cost reduced. Additionally, given the size and complexity of the project, the total includes over \$600,000 in contingency in the event of unexpected issues are identified during construction. The Village staff and Trustees have been and will continue to seek cost reduction options, while not sacrificing the quality and aesthetics of the project.

*Can the Village receive any grant fundings to reduce the Project cost?

Grants have been received to date totaling nearly \$700,000. The Village has identified the potential for several additional grants that will be applied for once the Project is approved and the design is substantially complete. All grants received will be used to lower the net Project cost. Any additional grant funding would reduce the existing storm water fees earmarked for the project.

*How is the Project being funded by the Village without any increase in taxes or fees to Village residents?



The Village extended the TID #2 expiration date to help fund the project. This will provide at least \$4.2 million of available funding for the Project.

Earmarked funding of approximately \$6.3 million of stormwater funds from current storm water charges each resident currently pays over the next 20 years. This amount includes the interest on debt issued to fund the construction costs. If grants, project cost reductions or other funding is received, this amount will be reduced. No increase in taxes or existing storm water fees will result from funding this Project.

*Will funds be sufficient to complete other storm water projects or needed repairs after the earmarked funds identified above?

The funds earmarked above represent about 65% of the existing storm water fees collected. Village staff and Trustees have reviewed the available fund balance and future collections and are satisfied that adequate funds will remain to maintain and complete storm water projects in the future.

*Will there be a Pathway included as part of this project?

A pathway is included in the Project plan just west of the railroad tracks and on the eastern border of the Project and connect Watertown Plank Road to Wall Street. A pedestrian bridge will connect the pathway to the business district on the northern end of the Sendik's store.

*What happens to the existing box culvert under the parking lot?

As a result of favorable soil sampling to date, soil from the excavation of the new creek will be used to fill the existing block culvert

I am passionate about completing this Project to improve safety and reduce storm water risk while enhancing the downtown. I will be voting **YES** on November 5th.

Public Works Update.

The Highland Pedestrian Pathway railroad crossing has been authorized by the State Office of the Commissioner of the Railroad (OCR) and CP Rail must install the pedestrian crossing no later than May 31, 2025. All efforts are being made to compete the project before winter.

Village of Elm Grove's Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan Process Needs Your Feedback

(ELM GROVE) The Village of Elm Grove is kicking off the process of updating its Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan. Building off the 2015 Comprehensive Park and Open Space Plan, this planning process will evaluate existing conditions in the Village's Park and recreation system, inventory its amenities, analyze its level of service, and make recommendations for future improvements to the Village parks, natural areas, recreational programming, and trails and pathways. The planning process will take place over the next 7 months with a goal of adoption in March 2025.

This plan is the guiding document for the Village of Elm Grove over the next 5-years. Having an updated Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan also makes the Village eligible and more competitive for grants and other funding sources. Completing the Plan by early 2025 will make it eligible for key state grants next year. The planning process will be guided by Village staff and the Recreation

Committee and it will focus on gathering public input, analyzing existing conditions, determining priorities and recommendations, and developing implementation action items to be pursued.

There will be a number of opportunities for the public to provide input in the planning process. Input opportunities will include an online survey where any resident or visitor can provide feedback on the park and recreation opportunities in the Village and goals for the parks in the future. The survey will help evaluate existing preferences and participation rates, in addition to guiding future priorities, needs, and projects. There will also be an opportunity for the public to review the draft Plan at a Public Open House later in the planning process.

The photo of this police car (which appeared in OCTOBER 2024 issue) is from 1954, not 1964. It is a 1954 Chevrolet that had been purchased by the Village during their subsequently incorporation attempt of 1953-1954. incorporation was ruled invalid in Waukesha County circuit court.)



Standing in front of the car is no mere police officer. It is Elm Grove's newly-hired first Police Chief, Ted Fejnas.

His tenure was short-lived, however. He lost his job when the incorporation efforts were overruled by Judge Allen D. Young. (The car was subsequently sold.)





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

Every day, I returned, and he was always there, landing on my shoulder, with abundant love and care. But The Summer turns to Autumn; the leaves grow gray and die.


I walked through the park one more time, just to say goodbye.

Ocean Acidification

Our team, Team Alpha Geek, participates in First Lego League Challenge at Burleigh and PPMS. Our team is made up of 4th, 6th, 7th and 8th graders.

Every season, we are given a theme that we use to develop a project. This year the theme is to solve a problem faced by people who explore the oceans. A problem that scientific and recreational ocean explorers face is ocean acidification. It is changing the ocean's chemistry and harming vital coral reef ecosystems, causing obstacles for explorers like the extinction of species before they're discovered and reduced coral diversity.

The way we live is putting excess Carbon Dioxide into our atmosphere that is being absorbed by the ocean. This causes pH levels to go down, making the ocean more acidic.

Kelp helps suck Carbon from the ocean. Our solution is the Kelper Helper Buoy. It monitors acidification and restores coral reefs. Some of the ways that our buoy restores reefs is by using kelp, adding alkaline materials, and playing a recording of healthy coral reefs to inspire coral larvae to settle there.

To help at home you can; compost, use less energy, and educate yourself and others.

Make America Great Again?

Eighty years ago, my father and four uncles joined sixteen million other Americans fighting for freedom over dictators during World War II. Those called the greatest generation won our freedom and preserved democracies around the world.

In the aftermath of World War II, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) was born to create solidarity among member countries. Article 5 of that charter states, "an armed attack against one or more (NATO members) shall be considered an attack against them all."

Russia refrained from attacking other nations during the Cold War period because of America's commitment to challenging any country that threatened member countries. Thus, began America's fame as a superpower. 

Police Department officers, along with EG Fire and EG EMS partnered with Reach-A-Child. In September, several members of each department met with former Reach-A-Child board president **Cory Erickson**, who provided children's books for our first responders to read to children to comfort them in a time of crisis.
